OBITUARY

Mr. Ward Bennett

Mr. Ward Bennett died on February 13th at the residence of his niece, Mrs. Warren Parker, Canning. The funeral service was held from the residence on Thursday, Feb. 15th conducted by Rev. F. H. Bone, burial at Pereaux.

Mr. Bennett was unmarried and leaves one brother Mr. Amos Bennett and several nephews and nieces. He was ill only about five days and was a man of very quiet habits and held in esteem by all who knew him.

STEPHEN E. BURGESS

The death occurred at Canning, on February 23rd, of Mr. Stephen E. Burgess, aged 77 yrs, and 7 months. The funeral service was held on Sunday afternoon from the Methodist Church conducted by Rev. R. U. Bell, assisted by Rev. Dr. A. C. Borden. There was a large attendance, burial at Upper Canard.

Mr. Burgess had been sick about two years and gradually failed until the end came. He was born at West Cornwallis and moved to Sheffield Mills with his father, John Burgess sr., and farmed there for many years. He married Caroline Stevens who died in 1903. About 15 years ago Mr. Burgess moved to Canning and built a fine residence there. He was a member of the Canard Presbyterian Church, a man widely known and held in the highest esteem by all. He leaves the following children: Mrs. H. M. Jacques wife of Col. Jacques, now in France; Fred E. Burgess, of Sheffield Mills; A. S. Burgess, a leading merchant in Canning, and Dr. Harry C. Burgess, now a captain in overseas service.

The High Cost of Living

Food Riots in Boston Cause Alarming Conditions.

With cries of "We must have food," "We want potatoes," a crowd of 300 men, women and children Thursday night stormed the grocery and provision store of J. Lipsky at 1 Spring Street, West End Boston, and, after upsetting barrels of sugar and fish carried away the contents. The hasty arrival of reserves from the Joy street station prevented a riot. The demonstration followed an open-air mass meeting to protest against the high cost of living. About 500 persons attended the meeting, which was held under the auspices of the West End Mothers' Club, and the women voted to bar social workers from their homes in the future.

Speakers at the meeting declared that even in Russia, in the midst of a war, the people were far better treated than in America, and declared that the Russian government, in contrast to the American government, took care to see that children were well nourished.

The women of the West End are planning to join with the women from all sections of Greater Boston for a mammoth demonstration in front of the State House.

Plans are being made to have 10,000 housewives in Greater Boston enter the parade to the State House.

Captain John B. Smith of the schooner *Carrie L. Hirtle*, which arrived Thursday from Nova Scotia with 5500 barrels of "spuds" as her cargo, immediately armed his crew to frustrate any attempt to take away the precious tubers. When these potatoes were loaded two weeks ago they were worth \$1.60 but their present value in Boston is \$3.75 a bushel. Captain Smith's profit on the cargo of potatoes will be approximately \$11,524.
