WARNED OFF

NEW YORK, Feb. 18—A cable from London to The Tribune says: One of the most sensational incidents that has occurred in racing circles for many years took place yesterday, when the stewards of the National Hunt Commission, the body which controls steeplechasing in England, "warned off" Tom Couthwaite of Hensford, who is probably the best known and ablest trainer of jumpers in the United Kingdom. Dr. R. Chadwick, the steeplechase jockey, who has been associated with Couthwaite's stable for some years. The stewards also severely censured "Jock" Ferguson, who until a few years ago was one of the most capable amateur riders, and who now manages the horses of C. Bower Smyth, a member of the family which founded the White Star line. Mr. Ismay, who is the owner of the Derby favorite, Craganour, is recommended to look more closely into the running of his horses.
