**PLED TO GENEVA.**

**PRINCESS OF SAXONY SAID TO HAVE ELOPED.**

Brother of the Princess is With Her—She Frequently Quarreled With Her Husband.  
London, Dec. 24.—The announcement that the Crown Princess of Saxony has severed all relations with her family has elicited throughout Germany, especially in Saxony, where the Princess enjoyed great popularity, a feeling of genuine regret. If the reports published in the newspapers be true, it was for the purpose of obtaining her father's consent to a divorce that the Princess went to Salzburg on December 9. She was unsuccessful, and left Salzburg unattended, by a train which started at 3 o'clock in the morning. Dresden has been thrown into a condition of mourning. The royal theatres are closed, and all the Court festivities for Christmas have been abandoned.

The disappearance of the Princess, Archduke Leopold Ferdinand, is quite a separate romance. It is stated that when she decided to rejoin her brother, her former French tutor, she thought the opportunity a good one to go away with an ex-dancer of the Vienna Opera House, who followed the famous example of Johann Orin in resigning all his rights as a member of the Austrian Imperial family.

Geneva, Switzerland, Dec. 24.—The Crown Princess of Saxony is here, under the name of Pauline von Olen. Her brother, Archduke Leopold Ferdinand, and Professor Giron are at the same hotel. The Princess has assumed the name of Duharony. The party are living quietly, and propose to spend Christmas here.

Although he seemingly had genuine admiration for his wife, the Prince did his share of quarrelling, and often tried to impose his will upon her, but he always hoped she would in the end humble herself. The Crown Princess' days at Salzburg were spent in collaboration with her father and mother, who did not excuse her for a moment in her desire to leave her position and family.

The man in this case who is associated with the Princess is a handsome, Frenchman, who was tutor to the Princess' children. He was temporarily discharged by order of the Crown Prince, Dec. 2. The tutor has disappeared, and now the Princess has fled together. An instance of the Princess' disregard of Court manners was her cycling through the streets of Dresden with a dentist, who, at her request, taught her to ride a wheel, although the King and Crown Prince commanded her not to learn. The Crown Princess had a lively, vivacious manner. She was independent, high-spirited, and was inclined to ridicule the observances of the Saxony Court, which takes itself most seriously.

The Crown Prince, who has recovered from the injury he recently sustained while hunting, drove out to-day with two of his sons. All the theatres in Dresden are closed to-night. The Court of the fugitive Princess has been dissolved.  
Berlin, Dec. 24.—A despatch from Dresden last evening to The Lokal Anzeiger confirms advice from Geneva, Switzerland, to the effect that the Crown Princess is in Geneva with her brother and French tutor, a French teacher of languages, whom she met during her last trip to Paris. He is described as 24 years of age and of a striking personality.  
Berlin, Dec. 24.—The Tagblatt's Dresden correspondent says: "The difficulty between the princely couple dates from prior to King Albert's death. They had several painful scenes during the King's illness. It is reported here that the Crown Princess' recent accident, ostensibly the breaking of one of his legs while hunting in the Bavarian mountains near Salzburg, was an invention, the fact being that he had a fight with his brother-in-law, Archduke Leopold Ferdinand, and the Crown Prince was badly injured. He was taken to his bed and returned to Dresden as soon as he was able. The Saxony Ministers say the affair is closed, so far as the Dresden Court is concerned. The letters of the Crown Princess have been seized."

**Y. I. ON THE GUNBOAT.**  
Does Not Know Whether He is Really Korean Treasurer.  
Berlin, Dec. 24.—A despatch from Seoul, dated December 20, says that when the Korean Cabinet was reconstructed Y. I. was appointed Minister of the Treasury, in compliance with the wish of Russia, but on Japan protesting against the appointment, Y. I. boarded a Russian gunboat, and is now on a Russian gunboat, pending a clearing of the situation.

**Ownership Councils.**

**RALEIGH COUNCIL.**

The above council met pursuant to adjournment on the 15th December, 1902.  
Present, James R. Irving, reeve, H. Jenner, A. J. Dolson and L. A. Pardo. The minutes of the meetings of Nov. 10th and 20th were read and confirmed.

Communications.  
From J. G. Kerr in reference to operate the highways to operate for oil and referring to section 657 of the Municipal Act, giving councils the power to lease.  
From the Raleigh Oil Co., represented by Messrs. Hickey and Neil, of Merlin wanting to lease the 10th, 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th, and 16th concession roads, west of and including Jenner side road, to operate for oil.

The above communications were favorably received, but being the last meeting were laid over for the next council.  
A certificate was received from P. Gilman that M. Flaherty and one from John Ferguson, that Geo. Russell had performed their statutory labor which was returned.  
Mrs. James Claus, Jr., wrote that she had been assessed for a dog but said dog belonged to James Claus, Sr., and asked that the dog tax be struck off.  
From J. C. Bell, M. H. O., that he had attended the family of Frank Grieves and quarantined the house for diphtheria and they were unable to pay the doctor's bill, of \$16.50.  
E. A. Dillon submitted his resignation as assessor for 1902.  
James Clayton submitted his resignation as commissioner for the Burns drain.

John A. Robinson, lot 7, Con. 4, paid his dog tax of \$2 for 1901.  
P. H. McPherson, assistant Provincial auditor, wrote advising the council to procure a land register for the treasurer to keep a check on the county treasurer's books, price of register \$5. Laid over.  
The Revere submitted an agreement from Samuel Sutton accepting \$15 in lieu of a bridge over the Keesey drain, opposite his part of lot 9, con. 7.  
Reports.

The following reports were submitted and on motion adopted, and fees ordered paid, viz.:  
A. J. Dolson, Div. No. 1, expended \$181.18; com. fees \$7.93.  
Jas. R. Irving, Div. No. 2, expended \$461.71; com. fees \$27.70.  
H. Jenner, Div. No. 3, expended \$115.74; com. fees \$24.94.  
L. A. Pardo, Div. No. 4, expended \$219.78; com. fees \$13.15.  
Jas. R. Irving, Bal. and Til. T. L., expended \$37.25; com. fees \$2.23.  
A. J. Dolson, that he had bridge over government drain No. 1, at 7th con. reported at a cost of \$30.46; com. fees \$1.00.  
James Clayton that the Burns drain was completed but not inspected by the engineer.

The clerk reported in reference to the surplus on the Mud and Indian Creek drains as follows:  
Proportion of surplus to Chatham, \$24.37.  
Harwich \$167.18.  
Benheim, \$187.  
Raleigh lands \$136.74, and roads, \$24.37.  
The treasurer submitted financial statement for the year showing a balance on hand of \$5,001.80.  
A. McDowell reported in reference to the Millar drain, that it would be useless to repair said drain unless the Fude drain was enlarged to give it a sufficient outlet.  
A. McDowell submitted report on the proposed repair of the Doyle drain. The estimated cost to Raleigh being \$75, and Harwich \$249.  
W. G. McGeorge submitted report on the construction of the Bullis Creek drain, estimated cost being \$1,182.30.  
The report was read and considered. Geo. Hitchcock and Mrs. A. E. Weir withdrew their names from the petition, and by so doing left the petition in the minority and the proposed work was abandoned. The clerk was instructed to levy the costs so far incurred on the parties who signed the petition.

The reports of W. G. McGeorge on the Bullis Creek and Freeman drains under the D. & W. C. Act, were adopted and costs ordered paid.  
The reeve reported he had settled the accounts of Wilson, Kerr & Pike, \$339.68, for collectors' fees, Williams vs. Raleigh, for \$350.00.  
S. L. Wellwood gave evidence that Jno. E. Barnett, pathmaster, had not warned him out to do his roadwork, nor any one of his family, but had returned his one day's work undone and it was entered in the collector's roll against him.  
Moved by Pardo and Dolson, that the engineer be instructed to find a sufficient outlet for the waters of the Millar drain—Carried.  
Moved by Jenner and Pardo, that the resignation of Ed. A. Dillon as assessor be accepted and the clerk prepare a by-law to appoint a substitute.  
Moved by Jenner and Dolson, that the taxes of M. Flaherty and George Russell be received, less their statutory labor—Carried.  
Moved by Pardo and Dolson, that the proposed repair of the Doyle drain be adopted and the clerk prepare a by-law and the court of revision be held on the 2nd day of Feb. 1903.—Carried.  
A number of accounts were passed.
