DESTRUCTION

Appalling Havoc Wasaght by Southern Tornado in Alabama.

Deaths Will Number 25 to 50, While Many Buildings Have Been Totally Destroyed.

Birmingham, Ala., Mazch 26.-In a tornado which yesterday swept over Jones Valley, in which Birmingham is located, 25 lives are estimated to have been lost and immense damage was done to property. Between 9 and 10 a. m. the storm raged with great. violence. Such havoc was created that up to 12.30 yesterday afternoon. the number of casualties had not been definitely fixed. Twenty-fivedead was however the general estimated. dead was, however, the general esti-mate. Of these seven were killed at Irondale, about fifteen in the city of Birmingham and the others in subur-

The entire fire and police departments turned out to render aid, and are still engaged in taking the dead. and injured from the debris and send-ing them to undertaking shops and

hospitals. At Pratt City the roof of the brick school was blown away, and the First Methodist Church was wrecked. Dozens of negro cabins were demol ished. The commissary of the Ten-nessee Coal and Iron Company was olown down. Great damage to grow-

ing crops and farm; houses in the vicinity is reported. Brighton and North Birmingham. were considerably damaged.
At Irondale the extent of the damage is not yet known, but it is stated that five stores were demolished in the business district and seven people

were killed. WIRES DOWN.

Atlanta, Ga., March 25. - All communication by wire between Atlanta and Birmingham is cut off. A wire is working as far as Leeds, on the Georgia Pacific. Over this line it has been learned that the storm passed to the north of Leeds.

IN GEORGIA. Chattanooga, Tenn., March 25.-The hurricane which swept Alabama is said to have struck the Chattanooga, Rome and Southern Railroad near Lynnville, Ga., a small station south of Rome, and destroyed several miles of tracks. Neither the officials of that line, nor of the Southern Railway, were able to get information as to their trains, all wires being down.
