### MEMORIAL SERVICES

Maple City Anglicans Pay Tribute to the Late Reverend and Honored Bishop Baldwin.

Judge Woods Addresses the Congregation of Holy Trinity Church at the Evening Service.

"Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord," was the text from which the Rev. T. Beverly Smith preached a splendid memorial service to the late Bishop Baldwin at Holy Trinity Church yesterday. Bishop Baldwin was born 66 years ago last June in the city of Toronto. He came of the Baldwin family, whose eloquence was traditional. After graduation, he joined a band of young clergymen whom Bishop Cronyn was gathering about him, and whose names were well known in the church to-day and were the following: Bishops Sullivan, Carmichael, Dameron and McLean. The late Bishop Baldwin was ordained in April, 1860, to the curacy of the English church in St. Thomas. Afterwards he became Rector at Port Dover. In 1865, he was made Rector of St. Luke's Church, Montreal, and in 1872 was called to be Rector of Christ Church Cathedral in that city. Eleven years afterwards, November 30, 1883, he was consecrated Bishop of the diocese of Huron.

### DOMINION BALLOT

Absolutely Secret—Assert Your Independence and Vote as You Like.

Any man who represents that the Dominion ballot is not secret is liable to the amount of \$200, under the Dominion Election Act, which sum can be recovered by any person who sues for it.

Here is the law: "It shall be deemed a false pretence within the meaning of this section to represent to a voter, directly or indirectly, that the ballot to be used, or the mode of voting at the election, is not secret."

known in part to the thousands who loved him in the western portion of this province. The day following the Bishop's death, the Bishop-elect of Caledonia, upon the floor of the provincial Synod declared that it was through the preaching of Bishop Baldwin years before, that God called him to the ministry. He is only one of the many who can testify to a work that is not recorded on earth in church statistics but only in heaven.

Mr. Smith said in closing, "We must all earnestly pray God to show us the one man who can succeed a so able, holy and devoted a Bishop. That can only be the ablest man the church in Canada can provide."

At the evening service Judge Woods spoke upon the life and work of the Bishop. In introducing him Mr. Smith stated that the Judge was 85 years of age and that it would be unreasonable to expect to have the pleasure of hearing the Judge much often in this life. The Judge gave the opinions of ministers of other denominations and thereby evidenced the reverence and high esteem in which the late Bishop was held by all.

Special hymns were sung and the choir, under the direction of Mrs. R. V. Bray, furnished special music. A memorial sheet on which was printed a hymn written by Bishop Baldwin, taken from the Montreal church hymnal, was used. The sheet also bore a good picture of the late Bishop.

Election Act. ### MR. TROTTER OF AYLMER

Eloquent Pastor Preaches Anniversary Services at William St. Baptist Church.

More Enthusiasm on the Street than in the Churches—Special Music by the Choir.

The Rev. Mr. Trotter, of Aylmer, conducted the anniversary services at the William street Baptist church on Sunday. Mr. Trotter is an eloquent preacher and his discourse was much enjoyed. Taking Gideon as an example, he pointed out the different qualities required in a true Christian. His text was, "And the Lord said unto Gideon, the people that are with you are too many."

The Englishman when a man was undertaking anything asked who his father was. The German wanted to know what education he had. The Frenchman enquired as to his manners. The American asked how much money he had. The Lord when he desired a man for an undertaking chose one who was courageous. Mr. Trotter said that he had read the Bible several times and he had never found the Lord pecking on a man who lacked courage. Although the Lord might select a modest man, still when the test came the one chosen was not found lacking in fortitude and valor.

Mr. Trotter went over the history of Gideon. When the Lord first came He found him threshing grain at the wine press with his father. They were at the wine press so that the Midianites might not suspect that they were threshing grain. The Lord called Gideon and told him to go and save Israel from the Midianites. The latter said that he was the least of his father's house and he wondered at being chosen. He, however, asked for proof and then the Lord wet first the fleeces and then the earth as requested by Gideon. This showed Gideon's position. Satisfied, the chosen one called all the people of Israel together and 32,000 responded. Then the Lord said that this was too many and all who were afraid were ordered to return home. This left 10,000. There were still too many and the Lord ordered that only those who lapped the water should be retained. This left only 300. The 10,000 had courage, but more than courage was needed. They were not all enthusiastic enough and thought too much of personal comfort, as evidenced by the 9,700 who stopped to drink. Enthusiasm was also needed in the churches to-day. There was more enthusiasm on the streets during the past three weeks than there had been in the churches for a whole year. The Lord wanted enthusiasm as well as courage, and both are needed in the churches to-day as much as they were in Gideon's little band. The Lord then ordered the 300 to break their swords and throw away their armor. This signified perfect submission. The hardest thing for a Christian to do is to give perfect submission. The Jews carried by Gideon's band signified the body of clay and the soul was the right. Often the body has to be broken before the light shows. Very often trouble draws men to the Lord.

The Rev. Mr. Trotter closed with a summary of the different qualities of the Christian as outlined in the sermon.

The choir, under the direction of Miss Blanche Baxter, provided excellent music at both services. At the morning service Miss Tena Harper, daughter of Ben. Harper, sang a solo. Miss Blanche Baxter, Miss Minta Oldenham, John Reeve and Robert Brown sang a quartette. The choir also rendered an anthem. At the evening service solos were rendered by Miss Blanche Baxter and Horace Davis, and the choir sang the splendid anthem, "Our Father which art in Heaven."

### EVENING SERVICE.

Among the many successful anniversary services recently held in the various churches throughout the city, were the services of the William St. Baptist Church yesterday. The day was fine and warm and the members and friends of the congregation turned out in large numbers to hear the able discourses of the minister for the day. The preacher secured for a special occasion was Rev. Ralph Trotter, B. Th., of Aylmer, and he preached two stirring and helpful sermons. Mr. Trotter is quite dramatic in his style of preaching and he was able to hold his audiences in rapt attention from the beginning.

In the evening Mr. Trotter took for his subject the word "Pardon." He took no text but dwelt at some length upon the significance of each word, and what it stands for. He told of being sent for one night to visit a dying man in one of the mining camps of British Columbia, and while he rode through the moonlight wondering what he would say to the sick man and also to the miners to whom he was soon to preach the message of Pardon was impressed upon by God, and the impression was so great it had never left him. The preacher discussed the subject under the following headings:

Throughout his discussion Mr. Trotter used several apt illustrations, many of them from scenes in British Columbia, where he spent several years of his life among the settlers and in the mining camps.
