Horseradish Sauce.
To make horseradish sauce mix well
together three tablespoonfuls of fresh-
ly grated horseradish, one tablespo-
onful of vinegar, a little salt and pepper.
Wipe to a stiff froth a quarter of a
pint of cream, and stir it very care-
fully into the mixture just before serv-
ing. Or a very good horseradish sauce
may be made by heating well together
a small quantity of grated horseradish,
two tablespoonfuls of mustard, two
tablespoonfuls of vinegar, one table-
spoonful of pounded white sugar and
then adding at the last moment
three tablespoonfuls of cream.
