**Editorial Notes**

In rising to second the motion of THE ACADIAN of last week, anent the practice followed by some weekly journals of appropriating editorial matter from contemporaries without due credit being given, the valued Berwick "Register" makes the error of thinking that we called attention to the matter in the spirit of complaint. On the contrary we signified our commendation of their good judgement so far as the editorials of this paper are concerned. Evidently our friend of the "Register" is endeavoring to fit a shoe on his own foot for which it was not intended, and in retaliation calls attention to a news item which appeared in THE ACADIAN last week and which, he complains, had already appeared in his paper. To this indictment we plead guilty, our defence being that no newspaper can be expected to exclude from its columns matter of news merely because such have already been in print. The item referred to had to do with the withdrawal of the morning and evening trains west of Kentville, and the peevishness of our contemporary may perhaps be explained as due to the sensitiveness of the Berwick scribe over this subject. Only the other day the "Register" was boasting that to that town alone was due the credit of having the train continued during the summer. It must have been a little disconcerting, to say the least, to be obliged to forgo the credit after all.

Our sketch of Wolfville in the long ago in last week's paper was evidently received with a good deal of interest, especially by older residents. This week we present another instalment. There is no doubt but that many inaccuracies will be found in this story but the main facts are not far out of the way. THE ACADIAN will be very glad to publish any corrections which may make the sketch of greater value, or any additional facts that may be offered by those who are competent to do so. There still remains a few citizens whose memory carries them back as far or further than the time of which we write and we venture to hope that some of these may contribute to our columns some items which will be of interest and value to our readers.

Now that spring has opened up no time should be lost in completing the work of erecting the tablet to the memory of Wolfville's brave boys who gave their lives in the Great War. This work was

interrupted last fall and has remained unfinished during the winter. It should be completed now and the tablet fittingly dedicated. This will enable the caretaker of the grounds to put them in condition early in the season and thus ensure the usual satisfactory state of the lawns. Wolfville people have reason to be proud of the grounds surrounding the public building and ought to be glad to assist in any way in their power in making them a still greater credit to the town. Some provision ought also to be made for suitably locating the captured German gun which so far seems to have been regarded by the authorities as an intruder for which no room could be found.

Wolfville set a pace for the other towns of the province in the matter of street construction and won a reputation for enterprise which has been of real value. If we wish to maintain our enviable position we must not be content to rest on our oars. The world moves and if we do not continue to push forward we will soon be hopelessly left in the rear. Good sidewalks are a necessity if we are to continue to rank as the foremost town of the Valley. The work has already been too long deferred and should be pushed on as rapidly as possible.

The time for cleaning up the accumulation of winter is close at hand and operations along this line will soon be in full swing. Every encouragement should be given citizens to dump refuse material at the "bridge" and thus get this place filled in and put in a respectable condition as soon as possible. The town authorities, if they are alive to the best interests of the town, will give every assistance in their power. This place, which might be made a credit, has too long been allowed to remain a blot upon the reputation of our pretty town.
