

POLITICAL PLATFORM OF THE UNITED FARMERS of N. B.

- No. 1 Whereas a call to the United Farmers of the different local branches for the putting up of independent candidates to represent the different constituencies both in the Federal and Local houses and that the responses have been practically unanimous in its favor, therefore we the officers and directors of the United Farmers authorize the organizing director of each county to call a convention for the purpose of selecting candidates for both Federal and Local houses.
- No. 2 Since it is absolutely necessary to have campaign funds for legitimate purposes, we would therefore authorize each county to raise and control such funds with the provision that it shall be itemized and audited and forwarded to the Sec'y of the Central Association and the source from which it is derived.
- No. 4 That we are entirely opposed to any form of bribery and corruption in elections.
- No. 4 That wilderness and un-improved land be taxed in proportion to the tax on improved land at the same rate and on the same basis.
- No. 5 That the registering of Mortgages be changed so that the amount actually due on mortgages can be ascertained at the registry office every year, such mortgage to be exempted on amount of mortgage still unpaid, and the holder of the mortgage be assessed on the amount and the taxes paid in the district wherein the land lies.
- No. 6 That we propose an act to be passed by our local legislature compelling any trunk telephone to give proper connections with Local or Farmers line for a reasonable toll.
- No. 7 That before any increase in telephone rates should be made, a full investigation be made before the proper authorities open to all parties interested, showing such increase to be justifiable.
- No. 8 That any man 18 years old be allowed to homestead 100 acres of land and a returned soldier 200 acres with the privilege of buying 100 acres additional in the Province of New Brunswick.
- No. 9 That we will work for an Abattoir, an establishment of a cold storage plant and stock yard in the Maritime Provinces.
- No. 10 That the Provincial and Federal representatives pledge themselves to resign on being presented with a petition signed by 60 per cent of the members of the U.F. of N.B. asking them to do so.
- No. 11 That we are in favor of total prohibition of the manufacture and the sale of liquor as a beverage and that plebiscite vote be taken at any time.
- No. 12 That we are in favor of general improvement of the roads of N. B. rather than the building of a speedway for autos in the province, and that we use auto taxes for Highway purposes only.
- No. 13 That we have a uniform system of breaking winter roads and that the workers receive pay for doing it.
- No. 14 We should aim to have a government of the day to appoint a Farmer as Minister of Agriculture.
- No. 15 That the Sec'y of Agriculture be a Farmer, a Farmer's son, a native of N. B. and a graduate of the college of Agriculture.
- No. 16 Whereas the United Farmers represent the Farmers more than any other organization, we would ask that the United Farmers be consulted on the general policy of the Agriculture.
- No. 17 That we recommend a rural delivery mail service be established in every country district.
- No. 18 That we adopt the Platform of the Canadian Council of Agriculture with the addition of clause G. to section 4 which reads as follows:
That firms holding charters for the development of the natural resources of the province. That these charters be cancelled unless the work be carried out within a reasonable time.
And the Exception of Section 6 which reads as follows:
Public ownership and control of railway, water and aerial transportation, telephone, telegraph and express systems all projects in the development of national power and of the coal mining industry.

ENCOURAGING THE SHEEP INDUSTRY

Inducement to use a Pure Bred Ram at the Head of Your Flock of Sheep

The New Brunswick Department of Agriculture and Forestry, in co-operation with the Dominion Live Stock Branch in encouraging the use of Pure Bred Rams.

Persons Eligible

Any sheep raiser who purchases a pure bred registered ram and who has not before at any time used a pure bred ram in his own flock shall be entitled to a premium of ten dollars (the first year) Five of which will be paid by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture and five by the Dominion Live Stock Branch, and an additional premium of Five Dollars the second year, payable by the Live Stock Branch. Applications for premiums to be sent in to Live Stock Division, Department of Agriculture, Fredericton, not later than December 1st.

Co-operative Purchasing of Pure Bred Stock

The Dominion Live Stock Branch will pay the travelling expenses to any point east of Fort William, Ontario, of any accredited man appointed by a Society, group of Societies or group of farmers who have orders to purchase at least twenty-five pure bred rams for farmers never having used a pure bred before. This same person has the privilege of making purchases of other live stock or rams for any farmer while on the trip, so long as the mini-

mum of twenty-five rams are purchased as outlined above.

Grading of Pure Bred Rams in New Brunswick

The services of professor Sackville of Ontario Agricultural College, have been secured to visit each pure bred breeder in the province and classify the rams offered for sale into three grades, superior—average and common. By purchasing your rams in the province, farmers can write any breeder of pure bred sheep and be sure of getting the class of ram he supplies for. New Brunswick is the first province to adopt this classification system. Breeders and Purchasers stand to gain by it. The number of rams for sale together with the price and grade will be listed with the local Live Stock Division.

Boys and Girls Sheep Clubs

In order to create a deeper interest among our farm boys and girls in the business of sheep raising, arrangements have been completed to organize Sheep Clubs in the province. Members must be between ages of ten to eighteen years. Ten members will constitute a Club. Two grade Shearling ewes will be the number allotted to each. Members can get credit from any bank for purchase price of sheep for one year at 6 per cent interest. The Department will arrange a fair at which prizes will be given. The Department will loan a pure bred ram to any Club with twenty ewes.
