The Great Trials in Scotland.

From New York Sun.

The conviction of the negligent directors of the City of Glasgow Bank is an event of much importance to the business community of Great Britain.

In the absence of a full report of the evidence we must assume that it sustained the charges against the several condemned defendants and warranted the verdict of the jury.

But the result is most significant in the prominence and clearness which it gives to the facts that the mismanagement of the bank is a crime—that it is not merely negligence, with a liability to respond to the injured party in pecuniary damages, but a violation of the criminal law, exposing the offender to the real horrors of prison life.

These directors lost twenty-five millions of dollars belonging to their bank. The simple loss however, even of this vast amount would not suffice to render them criminally liable. The prosecution which had just been instituted in their conviction was based upon three classes of facts.

One set of transactions embraced advances of the bank's money to certain of the directors or the firms to which they belonged. These advances were alleged to have been upon permanent removal and eradication, without any security at all. Under the law of Scotland, a trustee who obtains money for himself or his firm under these circumstances is held to be guilty of fraud and embezzlement.

Nearly half a million pounds sterling were advanced to the directors and their copartners in this way, according to the allegations of the indictment; but the cable dispatch indicates that there were only two convictions for this offence.
