THE NAVAL SUPREMACY.

Dutch Advices Say That Togo and Rojestvensky Are Already Battering Each Other.

British Experts of the Opinion That Togo Will Lure Russians Into Japanese Waters.

JAPS ALMOST CERTAIN OF VICTORY.

AMSTERDAM, Holland, April 12.—A fleet is now in progress near the Amboyna islands, east of the Malay Peninsula, according to a telegram from Batavia, island of Java, to the news papers. The despatch adds that five Dutch warships are near the scene of battle. Details are lacking.

No Confirmation of Fighting.
LONDON, April 12.—No confirmation has yet been received in London of report from Batavia, Java, of a naval battle between the Amboyna islands, and as there is no cable connection with Batavia it is difficult to see how the news could have got such news before Singapore. A despatch to Lloyd's from Singapore confirms the Associated Press' first information regarding the composition of the Russian squadron which passed there April eighth. Lloyd's agent says it was composed of seven battle ships, two armored cruisers, five unarmored cruisers, three converted cruisers, seven torpedo boat destroyers and steamers and hospital ships and a tug.

Opinions of Experts.
NEW YORK, April 12.—A London despatch to the World says—Rear Admiral Coxton, a distinguished naval strategist and expert, writes in the London Daily Telegraph: "We may expect that the whole passage of the Russian fleet to the north through the China Sea will be marked by continual harassing by Japanese torpedo boat destroyers, whose supreme object will be to wear down the Russian fleet ship by ship, and when the supreme moment arrives for action between the battle fleets, if such an event should take place, Admiral Togo's superiority may even be greater than at present. It is probable that there will be little occurring in the way of a naval action while the Russians are so close to territorial waters. At present they could seek sanctuary almost any moment, if it was desired, and this is not what the Japanese wish. So that if Admiral Rojestvensky does not go into Saigon (French Cochinchina) to carry out essential repairs, I should say the first serious engagement will take place on the coast of the Philippines. This, it is added, brings the three thousand men. It is doubted, however, that Russia will attempt to hold the island."

Collier Refused Clearance Papers.
SINGAPORE, Straits Settlement, April 12.—The German collier, Hindoo, now at this port, loaded with 1,300 tons of Cardiff coal for the island of Langkasa (east of Banka island and between Borneo and Sumatra) has been refused clearance papers for Saigon, unless her commander gives bonds to deliver the cargo through the British Consul there. A guard has been placed on board the steamer.

Operations in the Field.
TOKYO, April 12.—Reports received here from Manchuria indicate that the Russians continue concentrating their troops and strengthening the Changchun-Kirin line. General Madafoff's force continues in touch with the extreme Japanese left. Skirmishes are frequent and may possibly develop into an engagement. It is reported that the Russians have armed the convicts of the island of Sakhalin, promising money and freedom to those fighting bravely. This, it is added, brings the garrison of Sakhalin up to a total of three thousand men. It is doubted, however, that Russia will attempt to hold the island.

Engineer Little was caught under the engine and instantly killed, while fireman Dickey had an arm and two legs broken.

QUEBEC, QUE., April 12.—Hon. Thomas Greenway of Crystal City, Man., M. P. for Lisgar and as Premier of the Province, was here yesterday attending to the shipment of a car-load of Short Horns and Ayreshires secured in this vicinity, together with some special lines of seeds to further improve his farm. He stated that immigration into Manitoba this year would be very great, estimating it at 150,000. Mr. Greenway left for Ottawa last evening.

TORONTO, April 12.—The Globe's Ottawa special says: It is said that the Government have practically decided to assume control of Montreal harbor and take over its debt. The only questions remaining to be settled, according to the reports, is when the change shall go into effect. It is not expected that any Legislation will be introduced this session.
