General Intelligence. LARGEST IN CANADA. Ottawa Journal: The largest passenger engine in Canada is now at the C. P. R. round house here waiting inspection by Hon. A. G. Blair, minister of railways and canals.

The engine is one of the latest pattern and was made by the Baldwin Locomotive Works of Philadelphia. It has six large driving wheels, each six feet in diameter. It is equipped with what is known as a vertical compound cylinder which uses the steam twice. The cylinders are 22 by 24, and much larger capacity than the ordinary. Ready for the road the engine weighs 95 tons and can steam at a rate of 85 miles an hour when light.

When drawing eight passenger coaches she can run at a speed of 75 miles an hour and can easily make 60 miles an hour. The engine is of the Mogul style and was exhibited at the Atlanta exposition held in Georgia recently. It ran for a time on the famous Royal Blue line between Philadelphia and Washington. The Blue line trains have to make a speed of 55 miles an hour.

The engine is to be used on the Intercolonial railway for passenger traffic and will probably be the fastest passenger engine in Canada. MONTGOMERY. A fire broke out Sunday morning about 2 o'clock in the three story wooden building occupied by the Central Bookstore and Mr. Bleakney as a boarding house. The fire started in the kitchen of the boarding house and burned a good part of the rear, though fortunately it was prevented from spreading. The Central Bookstore was completely wiped out by fire on Monday morning and they had only opened up two days before. The goods were taken out in fair condition. The building was owned by the Merchants Bank of Halifax and J. L. Black of Sackville. The damage to the building is nearly two thousand dollars covered by insurance. Mr. Bleakney had one thousand dollars on furniture, which covers the loss. One of the boarders had a narrow escape from suffocation.

NEWS NOTES. TRINIDAD, Dec. 21.—Several thousand Arabs, who have been demonstrating outside the gates of this place, have been surrounded by Turkish troops. The shops of the city are closed and the Arab agitation against the government is increasing. There were disturbances on Dec. 17 at Amree, near here. All the houses inhabited by Hebrews were pillaged. A number of Spanish generals have protested to the Government against President McKinley's message to the United States Congress, and considerable excitement has been caused in Spain as a consequence. Hon. Edward Blake will sail for Ireland December 29.

The total amount of butter manufactured in the cranberries of the North West Territories this summer amounted to 478,978 lbs. There were sixteen cranberries in operation, where there had been three the previous year. Arrangements are being made to pack the butter from these cranberries for the Japan and Klondike trade. The World says that there are 90,000 unemployed in New York out of a total of 3,000,000, a proportion of nearly 30 per cent. of the total number of workers. There it says: "This is a situation which should not exist. Why does it exist? What is the cause? What the remedy? Its own answer to the question would be in order. The late Hon. Jas. Mitchell carried life policies of insurance amounting to some \$20,000. A carload of live turkeys, containing over 800 birds, was shipped from Sasek to the United States last week. J.
