THE FAR EAST.

Another Great Battle Expected to Take Place.

JAPS REINFORCED.

Japan Sends 60,000 Fresh Troops to the Front.

General Kuroki's headquarters, Oct 31—via Fusan, Nov 1:—The Russians took advantage of the bright moonlight last night to cannonade the Japanese positions on the left wing of the central army, but were repulsed after an action which lasted several hours, during which both infantry and artillery were brisk and continuous until daylight. The Japanese today for the last time replied to the Russian bombardment, which has been frequent for several days past.

Mukden, Nov 1—The Japanese army is being rapidly reinforced and it is expected that the new troops will shortly reach from 40,000 to 60,000. This greatly complicates the problem confronting the Russian commander.

A cannonade against Poutloff (Lone Tree Hill) has been in progress since the night of October 30, without effect.

St Petersburg, Oct 21—A despatch from Gen Kurapatkin dated Oct 30 announces a significant movement of Japanese from the west eastwards. The Japanese are receiving re-inforcements from the south and southeast and are evidently concentrating for an offensive movement. The weather is fine but is cold during the night.

Harbin, Oct 31—The activity of Chinese bandits is increasing along the railroad and the region is swarming with Japanese spies in Russian, Chinese and European disguise who are offering large rewards for the capture of Chinese engaged in supplying the Russian commissaries holding thus to cripple the Russian supply department.

London, Nov 1—Under date of October 31 the Daily Telegraph's correspondent at Tien Tsin says:— "The Chinese Government today formally prepared itself against any further infringements of neutrality in the despatch of supplies to belligerents, and in this connection has sent troops to Shan Hai Kwan. This is a serious blow to Russia, who is now without open ports in the East."

London, Nov 1—A Brussels despatch says that a Russian loan of \$270,000,000 was signed on Saturday. The Rothschilds guarantee the success of the whole loan.

London, Nov 1—King Edward who is taking a warm interest in the victims of the North Sea affair, sent Sir Frederick Treves, the court physician, to superintend an operation on Boatswain Hewart of the steam trawl "Swain".
