OUR MEN DROWNED FROM BOAT WHILE PLACING HEAVY ANCHOR

Five Men in Boat When Bottom Was Pierced by Part of Anchor— Boat Immediately Filled and Sank, Throwing Men Into Water—One Swam Ashore.

ONLY ONE BODY RECOVERED

It is not often that Campbellton is stirred to its depths by a sad calamity, but today this town mourns the loss of four of its citizens; four men who at the dinner hour left wives and children never to return to their fireside alive, and the town mourns with them.

The Particulars. A number of men are at present engaged in making the necessary repairs to the Shives Lumber Co.'s shingle mill here. After dinner it was decided to replace the haul-up chain on its pulley. This pulley or sprocket wheel is under water and extends out into the river a few feet. It was necessary to rig gear to haul the heavy chain out to place it in position. For this purpose a heavy anchor, which in this case was a heavy wheel through which there was a piece of shafting) was to be placed in the river directly opposite the haul-up slip. For this it was necessary to use a boat. The five men, Barney Maltais, Fred Clark, Simon Tennier, Jos. Rousi and Harry Savidant, procured a boat, carefully loaded the anchor and set out. The wind was blowing hard and quite a sea was running. When the desired locality was reached the men in the stern of the boat prepared to drop the heavy anchor overboard. Just what happened will never be known, but it is thought that the rocking of the boat overbalanced the men, lifting the heavy weight, and they dropped it. The piece of shaft went through the bottom of the boat, tearing off about four feet of the planking, through which water poured, and before the men knew what had happened all were struggling in the water. They were heavily clothed and had on top boots. Savidant, a strong swimmer, was the only man to reach the shore. He was in a dazed condition and hardly knew what had happened or what had become of the others.

RESTIGOUCHE AND WESTERN RAILWAY BONDS WERE DULY CANCELLED SAYS MR. MCKEOWN

Really Important Part of Transaction Was on Record in Counties of Victoria and Madawaska--Hazen Departing From Platform Severely Criticised.

(Special to the Morning Graphic) commented. These bonds he had signed after being assured by Mr. McKewon and the manager of the Royal Trust Company that the former bonds and the mortgage they represented had been cancelled. Mr. McKewon followed and read to the committee the certificate of the notary, Mr. F. R. Taylor, who was appointed by all the parties to see to the cancellation of the \$150,000 bonds held by the Eastern Trust Co. Mr. McKewon also explained that while it was impossible that this document should be on file in the provincial secretary's office, the really important part of the transaction was on record in the Counties of Victoria and Madawaska where the old mortgage was cancelled and the new one recorded. He stated the incident except that the committee passed a vote of thanks to Messrs. Robinson and McKewon for their attendance and explanation, afterwards passing the item over which the discussion arose. Before proceeding with the business of the committee Mr. LaBilloy said that he had just received a telegram from Mr. McMalloch, who informed that forty miles of the railroad were now completed and that upwards of ten miles on the St. John River end were graded. The right of way was all settled and much work done along the line. Three hundred men were now employed and in a month 500 more would be at work. The announcement of progress greatly pleased the members of the committee. The Highway Act was up for consideration in the House this afternoon and the Opposition scored a distinct victory over the government by pointing out that the present act in delegating the control of the Highways to boards composed partly of government appointees and partly municipal councillors was a distinct violation of the platform of the present government during the election. It was the first real attack of the Opposition of the government measure and the glum looks of the provincial secretary and the bitter expression of the premier was conspicuous evidence that they didn't enjoy the evening they got at the hands of Messrs. Robinson, McKewon, Copp, Lowell and Tweeddale. Mr. Byrne and Dr. Sormany of Gloucester also condemned Mr. Hazen for the departure from his platform.

Man Said to be in Toronto With \$10,000 Worth of Fine Gems.

(Special to the Morning Graphic) NEW YORK, Monday. — The American has received the following despatch from Toronto—News has just reached here of the discovery of a diamond field of great richness and magnitude at Motiway River, between Lakes Matagami and Shawagana, in the Province of Quebec. The fields are of vast extent, and pockets of stone of first water are found scattered over a blue clay district for a distance of twenty miles.

These new fields were located by a young American named John A. MacKenzie, and his guide, Indian Joe. After a two summer's search, MacKenzie has arrived here with \$10,000 worth of diamonds, pronounced by experts to be of first water. It is said that Tiffany of New York, sent two expeditions last summer on a diamond hunt in this district, but they headed too far east and failed. HIGHWAY ACT AGAIN UP IN LOCAL LEGISLATURE YESTERDAY

Ex-Premier Robinson and Other Members Score Premier Hazen For Departing From Policy.

(Special to the Morning Graphic) FREDERICTON, Wednesday. — Mr. Hathaway presented a petition from the St. John branch of the Canadian Women's Suffrage Association to amend the New Brunswick election act to include women in the franchise. Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the Registry act, providing that the seal of registrar be affixed in all cases. Hon. Mr. LaBilloy presented a petition in favor of the Restigouche Boom Company's bill. Hon. Mr. Robinson introduced a bill to authorize the Moncton School Trustees to issue debentures and to fix the value of certain property in their city. Hon. Mr. Robinson gave notice of enquiry concerning John McCormick's dismissal as caretaker of the Woodstock and Melville bridges. The house in committee considered the bill for the appointment of a commission to investigate the Central Railway which bill met with some opposition.
