The public, we have said, are most interested in supporting an efficient fire department; but experience has shewn that voluntary contributions by a portion of the public, (for all cannot be brought to furnish their quota in the absence of a compulsory law) are wholly inadequate. We deny the justice of the practice of Montreal or Quebec, or any officer town, obtaining and from the Legislature for fire engines, &c. This apartial, and is not healing fairly with our country.
