## REGULAR MEETING T. I. L. EXECUTIVE

The Council's Recommendation of Candidate for P. M. Talked Over

The Executive of the Newcastle Town Improvement League met in regular monthly session in Council Chamber, June 10th, immediately after Council meeting.

There were present: Pres. J. M. Troy, who presided; Vice-Pres. D. J. Buckley and Mayor Stotmart; Sec. Treas. H. H. Stuart; Revs. P. W. Dixon, M. S. Richardson and S. J. MacArthur; Ald. Stables, Mackay and Doyle; and Messrs. T. A. Scribner, J. J. Ander, C. E. Fish, A. McCabe, Wm. McMaster and Peter A'haran.

Mr. Fish asked what had been done about recommending a Police Magistrate. What had occurred in the last meeting and in the Council was repeated to him.

D. J. Buckley wanted to know why the two names selected by the last meeting of the T. I. L. had not been sent to the Government.

The Secretary read the motion passed, as follows: That we submit the two highest names of J. R. Lawlor and John Clark, to the Town Council. It was evidently the intention of that meeting to have the Council decide between those two names and submit only one to the Government.

Mr. Buckley understood that the motion had been to submit the two names to the Council both to be submitted by them to the Government.

Rev. S. J. MacArthur said the T. I. L. had limited itself to two names.

Mr. Fish said that the government would, no doubt, do what they pleased anyway. He asked if it were not possible to have it arranged that two magistrates sit on all Scott Act cases. The Justice of Scott Act decision was being continually challenged.

Rev. Mr. MacArthur regretted that this question had not been raised at an earlier date. He understood there was nothing to prevent those who were interested in Scott Act cases having their causes tried by two magistrates rather than by the P. M.; that is, the prosecutor had the choice of before whom to go.

Ald. Stables—There shouldn't be any hitch anyway. Both sides are supposed to want justice merely.

Rev. S. J. MacArthur—A great difficulty in enforcing the C. T. A. was in getting papers properly drawn up. Cases were often lost because of defective complaints. If the magistrate was sympathetic with the C. T. A., he might remove technical defects. If he were out of sympathy, he could often throw out cases. The law provides against prosecution. The magistrate should be able to issue papers properly. The hour being late the meeting adjourned.
