Rev. W. A. Ross conducted the charting of the Parishes of the county, counting 100 as perfect, the different parishes were awarded the following for effectiveness of their schools:

Chatham—85  
Newcastle and Nelson—58  
Blackville—58  
Ainwick—57  
Glenelg and Hardwick—55  
Ludlow and Blissfield—52  
Derby—30

The classification was made on the following basis: Every congregation organized in S. S. work; delegates to annual convention; a parish rally, at least five department superintendents in the District, delegates to county convention, reports of all schools to District secretaries; of schools 75% evergreen; every school visited by a parish officer, subscription paid to association on fund 50%.

The S. S. enrollment was reported over 3000 for the county; average attendance 70%. Enrolled in Home Department 344. There are 5 teacher training classes, reporting enrollment of 32. Four of them are at Boiestown, Chatham, Newcastle and Tabacintac.

At 11 o'clock a conference on parish work was conducted by the Provincial secretary, Rev. W. A. Ross.

The afternoon session began at 2 o'clock, with devotional exercises led by Rev. W. B. Rossborough, who spoke from the text: "God is in His Temple, let all the earth keep silence before Him"
