## FIRST FINE FOR GIVING RECEIPT WITHOUT STAMP

**St. John Woman Pays \$10  
For Neglect Of Excise Law.**

The importance of persons placing a stamp on a receipt, was shown at the St. John Custom House a few days ago, when a woman who had neglected to carry out the law was fined \$10 by the Collector of Customs. Any receipt for the amount of \$10 or more, must have a two cent stamp on it, and this means a receipt for anything where a payment is made. On and after October 1, the ordinary postage stamp will not be accepted, and an excise stamp must be used. The case mentioned is the first in which a fine has been imposed in New Brunswick for the disregarding of the stamp law.

## LUMBERMEN MAKE YEARLY PAYMENTS

More than a quarter of a million dollars has been received at the Department of Lands and Mines during the last week in payments from lumber operators of New Brunswick due August 1st.

August 1 is the date upon which annual payments of stumpage are due from the licensees operating upon the Crown Lands of the province, and upon this date also license fees as well as the provincial fire tax are payable. These make the present the busiest period in the year for the receiving branch of the Department, and it was stated that the returns so far were "highly satisfactory." This year in addition to the usual amounts due on August 1st, payments were also due in connection with the bonus fixed in 1913 which leases also expired and were renewed for twenty years. The arrangement at that time called for fifty per cent of the bonus sums to be paid down and the remaining fifty per cent, about \$300,000 was to be paid on August 31st, 1923. but as a result of representations which were made some time ago the government extended the period for payment and only fifty per cent of balance which would be twenty five per cent of the original gross amount was ordered paid, the balance being carried over for a year.

## PRESIDENT HARDING DIED THURSDAY

President Harding died from apoplexy at 7:30 Thursday evening as Mrs. Harding was reading to him from a magazine, doctors were summoned and pronounced the President dead. He died from apoplexy or rupture of a blood vessel in the brain. Death came with remarkable suddenness, the President being reported as vastly improved after several examinations during the day by five physicians attending him. The body was sent by special train from San Francisco at 7 p.m. Friday to Washington and later to Marion, Ohio, Harding's home city for burial.

Calvin Coolidge, Vice President of the United States took the Presidential oath in the early hours of Friday morning and left Plymouth, Vermont, for Washington to take up his duties as Chief Executive of the country.

King George has commanded that his court shall wear mourning for President Harding for a week beginning Friday. Premier Baldwin sent a message of sympathy to Mrs. Harding. The sight of the American flag flown at half mast over the embassy was the first intimation many Americans had of the death of President Harding.
