Miss Annie McGowan, who formerly taught in the junior division of the school here, has been engaged as successor to Richard Miller, who resigned lately. The bridge, being no longer considered safe, was closed up last Wednesday, and will not be re-opened until the new structure is completed. Teams have to ford the river below the dam. A very interesting base ball match was played here on Saturday afternoon last, between the Dungenannon and Auburn clubs. The game passed off nicely, the best of feeling prevailing all through. SCOTT ACT.—People in this vicinity are beginning to express their views as regards the Scott Act. A large number are in favor of it, a few don't say any-

thing about it, and a smaller few are opposed to its being passed. The person appointed to get signatures to the petition has not put in an appearance yet. Whatever it is to be done should be done quickly. The Rev. W. Sheritt delivered a lecture on the Scott Act in the Methodist church west of here on Monday evening last to a large audience. Part of the Scott Act was read. The lecture was full of encouragement to Temperance workers. There's a hard battle to be fought in this part of the county.

A Hotel-keeper's Story.

EDITOR ENTERPRISE:—Will you please allow me to correct the statement made in your last issue, that it was owing to D. D. Wilson's temperance principles that the Licensed Victuallers resolved to charge him double prices. Now, I claim that it was for the use of intemperants that he made that charge, and that he only for the drinking usages we could not give those cheap rates, and he for one would be willing to pay double. He is a man doing a large business, has from thirteen to twenty teams on the road dependent on hotels for accommodation, and has also had a lower rate than other travellers. Now, in all the years that he has been in business in Huron he has not made an immense sum through the drinking customs just to taunt his honest convictions he ought to be ready and willing to pay the extra price and not beholding to others for a low rate nor want to wait until the Scott Act comes in force before being willing to pay the right price. And further, he has given the public information on the subject of his time, influence and money to hurt the hotel trade and further the Scott Act, and I claim on these grounds that the Association was right in passing the resolution, and any hotelkeeper that fails in charging him what he says is the right price takes no interest in defending himself. Letter from D. D. Wilson, Esq., of Scotland.

Editor Enterprise: I notice in your issue of June 21st, a letter from Archibald McIntosh, proprietor of the Albion Hotel, Gorrie, in which he asserts that "the Licensed Victuallers of Huron" resolved to charge me double rates because I "used intemperate language against the hotelkeepers," and that I had stated that I knew that only for the drinking usages the hotelkeepers could not give me those low rates, and that I would be willing to pay double." Also that I have had lower rates than others. In reply I may say that I never used the language attributed to me by Mr. McIntosh, hence the resolution of the Licensed Victuallers of Huron is based on false premises. I have said, and now say again, that I am quite willing to pay increased rates provided the present rates are not remunerative, but I never said that I knew that but for the drinking usages the hotelkeepers could not give me those low rates. On the contrary, I believe that present rates or charges do remunerate the hotelkeepers, as similar accommodation is obtained for similar charges in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, where the Scott Act is in force. Further, I have never asked for any reduction of rates for my men and teams, nor do I know of having paid less than others for similar accommodations. Further, I have no desire to injure the hotelkeepers, but I believe that were the sale of intoxicating liquors not permitted in the hotels it would be for the best interests of the hotelkeepers, both morally and financially, as well as for all business men and for the whole community.

Prohibitory Classes of the Scott Act.

Intoxicating liquors can be sold only by druggists or other vendors licensed by the Government, and their number must not exceed one in a township or parish, two in a town, and one for every four thousand inhabitants in a city. Wine can be sold only for sacramental purposes, on certificate of a clergyman, stating that the wine is required for that purpose. For medicinal purposes intoxicating liquors can only be sold on certificate from a medical man. For art, trade, manufactures, etc., a certificate from two justices of the peace and the affirmation of the applicant are required; and when selling for any of the above purposes the druggist must file certificate and affirmation and register name of the purchaser and quantity sold. In wholesale quantities not less than ten and in the case of beer not less than eight gallons can be sold at a time, and then only to druggists or other licensed vendors, or to persons who will take it out of the county, or beyond the limits of any other counties where the Scott Act is in force. It passed in any county, its towns, villages, and all divisions or municipalities, except cities, are included.

Two Belligerent O'Briens.

New York, June 29.—A cable special says:—During the debate on the Franchise Bill in the House of Commons during the early hours of yesterday morning William O'Brien, editor of *United Ireland*, made a speech in which he savagely attacked the Orangemen. He was repeatedly interrupted by Sir Patrick O'Brien, M.P. for King's county, who finally gave him the lie direct. Both of the O'Briens who, by the way, are not relatives, lost their tempers, and each challenged the other to come outside the sacred precincts of the House and settle their differences in the good old style of Sir Lactus O'Trigger. Sir Patrick appears to have been in dead earnest, for he immediately retired to the river terrace in the rear of the House of Parliament, expecting that his namesake would follow. William O'Brien, however, did not deign to attend, and Sir Patrick has ever since been denouncing him as a coward. Speaking of the matter today Sir Patrick said, "The main thing that angers me against the man is that

How he ever came by it I don't know. However, I would have willingly taken him out and have taken a shot at him if he had been gentleman enough to accept my challenge, but what can you do with a coward? Later in the day William O'Brien gave his version of the incident. He said, "The simple fact is that my noble namesake was drunk. I confess that I allowed his taunts to irritate me before I noticed his condition, but when that was pointed out to me I treated his vapourings and his challenge with silent contempt. Everybody is aware that Pat is simply an eccentric old 'blatherhead,' and nobody minds what he says."

A Big Blaze in Brussels.

On Saturday morning at 1:30 a fire broke out in the frame building occupied by E. Dunford, merchant tailor, and T. McCulloch, boots and shoes, Brussels. The flames spread rapidly, cutting off all chances of saving anything. The next building to take was a large frame stable belonging to the Central Hotel. It was soon burned down. The Central Hotel next caught fire in the upper story. George Baeker's two storey brick building, used as a grocery below and dwelling above, was soon one mass of flames. The Trencham House, a four storey, mansard roof, veneered brick building, stables and sheds, owned and occupied by Mr. F. Frey, being the next building to the south, also took fire, and in spite of all efforts to save them, were completely burned to the ground. A part of the furniture and stock was saved. The following are the losses: F. Frey, loss on building and stock, \$9,000; insured for \$4,600; George Baeker, loss on building \$2,300; on stock of groceries \$1,000; insured for \$2,300. Thos. McCulloch, boots and shoes, loss on stock and tools, \$500; loss on furniture, etc., \$200; insured on stock \$300; A. Mickus, loss on building and damage to Central Hotel, \$2,100; insured. T. O'Neill, damage by removal of stock and furniture out of Central Hotel, \$700; insured. E. Dunford, stock of clothes, etc., total loss \$4,000; insured for \$500.

A Buffalo telegram says: The Marquis of Bibbero is here and making preparations to attempt to swim Niagara rapids in the same place where Webb lost his life. The Marquis intends making several attempts before trying the whole. First he will send on an oblong coffin shape box, air tight, and covered with wax of the consistency of flesh; if this wax is torn when the box is recovered he will make soundings for depth of water. The final experiment will be made with an India rubber dummy with inflated bladders for lungs. Should these bladders burst the danger of asphyxia will be apparent. If the result of these preliminary experiments is satisfactory the Marquis will give himself up to the water. Bibbero is a navigator of prominence in England and will undoubtedly do as he says.
