### IMPROVEMENTS NEEDED.

That the condition of the Court-room is not what ought to be expected in the principal edifice of the county of Huron has long been conceded by many, but the matter was brought prominently to the front last Saturday by his Lordship Mr Justice Rose in open court, when, while waiting for the jury to return a verdict on one of the cases, the following dialogue took place:

His Lordship—Mr Garrow, do you not think something might be done towards inducing the County to supply a better courtroom for the accommodation of the public? The present room lacks ventilation, is heated in a very imperfect and unhealthy way by these stoves, and the air in the room becomes so tainted that it is very difficult to work in it. Don't you find it so?

Mr Garrow—Yes; and I have done so for years past.  
His Lordship—Well, in other countries we have succeeded in obtaining proper accommodation by inducing the County for maintaining a nuisance, and perhaps that course will have to be taken here. If I had thought of it I would have mentioned it to the Grand Jury at this court before I discharged them. Should I live to return to Goderich I shall certainly take the matter up, and would like your co-operation.

It is time something was done by the County Council along the line indicated by his Lordship. The courtroom is badly heated, poorly ventilated, and, during the night sessions, is wretchedly lighted. Efforts have time and again been made to force the County Council to move in the matter but without avail, and it would almost seem that nothing short of the drastic remedy suggested by Mr Justice Rose will compel the much needed change.

### WHAT THE ISSUE SHOULD BE.

The Hamilton Times has a thoughtful article upon the advice that is being gratuitously given Mr Laurier by the Mail, to break from his fellows and ally himself with those who want to annihilate Mr Mercier and his supporters in Quebec. The Times points out that race and creed are not and should not be made political issues. After dealing clearly and openly with every phase of the question, our Hamilton contemporary gives the following as the fighting ground of the political parties instead of narrow sectionalism and narrow creeds:

"What is the alternative? To leave religion to the consciences of individuals and race to the records in the family Bibles. To fight our political battles on political questions, of which the tariff is the chief one in the Dominion, and the method of taxation for municipal and Provincial revenue the chief one in each of the Provinces. Teach the people the advantages of free trade and direct tax-

ation, and let them vote to get those advantages. Reduce the Dominion tariff to the lowest notch. Make the Provincial Legislatures collect their own revenues by direct taxation. Do not let the Dominion Parliament build or subsidize any more railways. Shut off that method of bribery. Let each Province own, control and pay for its own public works. With direct taxation the rule and not the exception, there will be no waste of public money. When the Provinces need ground rents for public revenue the churches which own land will have to pay their share the same as individuals."

It now looks as if in the Cronin murder case at Chicago, one of the accused gentlemen, named Boggs, is going to let the cat out of the bag. He wants to save his own neck, and like the Irishman of old, has been seriously asking himself the question: "What's the world to a man when his wife is a widow?"

If Goderich is not a railroad centre yet, it is nevertheless a centre for railroad agitation. In addition to the local movement in town, our friends of the Wingham, Duncannon and Port Albert proposed routes, held a meeting of the executive committee of that scheme in Goderich on Friday last. Verily Goderich is a favored spot, so far as projected railway ventures are concerned.

A Word or Two About New Publications That Have Come to Hand.  
THE METHODIST MAGAZINE FOR NOVEMBER, 1889.

The illustrated articles of the month are of sustained and varied interest. The Editor discourses on "Florence and the Italian Lakes," with numerous engravings of some of the most attractive scenes. The Rev J. Bond continues his interesting and instructive "Vagabond Vignettes," describing especially the cyclopedic of recent underground exploration at Jerusalem. Professor Wallace, of Cobourg, contributes a very illustrated article, entitled "Among the Swiss Clouds." An admirable memorial sketch of the late William Goederham, by the Rev Dr Hugh Johnston, is accompanied by a good portrait. The Rev W. S. Blackstock gives a very graphic account of the Channel Islands, where Home Rule has prevailed from time immemorial. The Rev Wm. Arthur's paper on "Medical Missions in India" will be read with much interest. Mrs. Barr's strongly-written story, "The Elder's Sin," is brought to a close. A fine poem by Senator MacDonald, "The Sailor's Grave," is given; and Mr Gladstone's vigorous paper on "The Battle of Beliefs" is reprinted. ### SCRIPPER'S MAGAZINE

For November contains a third African article—a valuable addition to the notable papers of Professor Henry Drummond and Joseph Thomson; a discussion of some startling problems in International Law affecting the United States in the event of another European war; the description of an old Spanish university by a well-known novelist; an explanation of the relation of electricity to health by a high medical authority; an army surgeon's account of the modern Sanitary Corps which relieves the sick and wounded; and interesting essays, fiction, and poems. Most of the articles are richly illustrated. Colonel H. G. Prout (Baroud Bey), an American Governor General of the Equatorial Provinces of Africa, and a trusted friend of General Gordon, writes of that little known region under the title "Where Emin Is." The W. & D. P. A. Railway executive committee held a meeting at Goderich on Friday last to take into consideration the procuring of a charter for the proposed route of railway. Mr. Meyers, of Wingham, was present on the occasion. We have not learned the result of the meeting. Further reference respecting it will be made in the near future.

Our popular V.S., Mr. John Cook, not being satisfied with the stock of horses in this village and vicinity, although there has been a great improvement in that line during the past, is anxious to further improve the stock, in view of which he left here on Wednesday last for the State of Vermont, U.S., to purchase a thoroughbred stallion of the Hambletonian stock. He is bound to secure the best and go ahead of any in this western country. We wish him success in his enterprise.

At the promotion examinations held in Duncannon school last week, in compliance with the P. S. law, in the senior department (Mr. G. S. Woods, principal), the following pupils were promoted from junior to senior IV: Lily McLean, F. Crawford, Emma Treasleaven, Estella Brown, Nathaniel Whyard, and Susie Cooke. From III. to IV.—Mary Pentland, Mary Stewart, Willie Givins, Herbert Whyard.

With reference to the necessity for railway accommodation in this section of country, as railway agitation seems to be the leading topic, we would here state that during last week upwards of ten carloads of lambs and cattle, of superior quality, passed through this village to be shipped from Lucknow to market, via G.T.R. For want of railway accommodation cattle dealers and others are laboring under great inconvenience and extra expense which, no doubt, is deducted from the price which otherwise would be to the farmer's benefit if the opportunity for shipping were close at hand.

On Tuesday, the 29th, the Judge's court of revision for the Wawaneos was held here, when six Reformers and two Conservatives were added. One struck off.

The municipal council of West Wawaneos will meet for the transaction of business in the town hall on Saturday, Nov. 9. All concerned are requested to govern themselves accordingly.

The court of revision of voters' list for the township of Ashfield was held here on Monday, 29th inst., his Honor Judge Toms presiding. When ten Conservatives and twenty-four Reformers were added. None were struck off.

Mr. R. R. Sallows will give one of his entertainments in the Orange hall on the evening of Friday, the 8th November. A treat is in store for those who attend. Among the novelties will be the drawing of a beautiful design on the screen by the cyclopedic, lately imported from England. There ought to be a good house as there will be good moonlight.

In the Montreal Superior Court Monday, Judge Jette decided that the Allan Steamship Company was liable for the depreciation of cattle detained by them owing to the "longshoremen's strike of 1880," the strike, in the judgment of the court, not being an adequate excuse.  
Dr. Schweinfurth, the African traveler, has written to the National Gazette that letters from Emin Pasha which have reached Capt. Wissmann justify the expectation that Emin Pasha and Henry M. Stanley will soon arrive at Mompasa.

John White, ex-M. P. East Hastings, who is in Ottawa, says he would have no difficulty in capturing North Hastings from Hon. Mr. Bowell were he to receive the nomination and accept the same for the Commons. He may, however, run for his old constituency, East Hastings.

At the residence of Mr. Kenneth McRae, Mr. Thomas Hanton was married to Miss Maggie McRae, of Amberly, by the Rev. Kenneth McDonald. The young couple took the morning train for their new home in Detroit.

OBITUARY.—Mrs. John Douglass, lake shore, departed this life on Oct. 3rd in her 76th year. She was sailing for years, but bore it patiently. She was a true Christian and a kind friend to all who knew her. She leaves a large family, fortunately in good circumstances. Her remains were interred in Kingston cemetery, followed by a large concourse of neighbors and friends.

The illness of the Duke of Edinburgh, which prevented his attending the funeral of King Louis in Lisbon on Saturday, is ascribed to a fainting fit experienced while visiting King Carlos. When he was attacked he fell to the floor, bruising his face badly. The Duke has sufficiently recovered to take his departure, and he paid a farewell visit to King Carlos on Monday. The bruises on his face are fast disappearing. The Duke has gone to Madrid.

The name of Archduke John has been stricken from the Austrian army list. It is said he will join the staff of the New York Herald.

On Friday last, as Hugh Pritchard was going to Lucknow, on the hill to the boundary line at the eighteen-mile river, a bolt came out of one of the cliffs, which caused the horse to run against the embankment, upsetting the heavy wagon. Mrs. Pritchard was carried unconscious to Mr. David Stewart's house, and medical aid was sent for. There is hope of her recovery.

There is now living in the Township of Bury, County of Compton, a couple by name Benjamin and Jennie Sylvester, to whom was born on the 27th June last a female child. This child at the age of three weeks weighed exactly fifteen ounces. She is now nearly five months old, and weighs but five pounds, fully washed in infant's flannels. At three weeks after birth a finger ring 3 inches in diameter was easily slipped over the hand up to the elbow. She is in perfect health.

Mr. Angus McDonald on Monday night lost his barn and stables and the whole year's crop by fire. The fire started about 9 o'clock in the evening. His son Alex. was at a neighbor's house and when coming home saw the fire on the burning floor, but it had too much headway and burnt everything about it. Two young colts were burnt in the stable, being forgotten. How the fire started is a mystery, as there was no one in the barn that night with a lantern. There is an insurance of \$1,000 in the Wawaneos Company, which will not nearly pay the loss.

There now seems to be a kind of open secret on the political horizon that Hon. G. E. Foster will retire from the Council in place of the Premier, who will continue on as Minister of Railways, at least until after next session, when a grand shuffle up is looked for.  
Emperor William took luncheon Tuesday on board the British flag ship Dreadnought, at Athens. In responding to a toast to his health he expressed his pleasure and pride on being elected an admiral of the fleet by Queen Victoria. From his boyhood, when he rambled in Portsmouth dock yard, he had taken the deepest interest in the fleet. "I congratulate you," he continued, "upon the result of my inspection. To-day Nelson's famous signal is no longer necessary. You all do your duty. We, as young naval nations, come to England to learn from the first navy in the world." In concluding, he asked for three cheers for the English navy. The German officers heartily responded. Emperor William will start for Constantinople to-morrow afternoon. The British fleet will escort him from the Piræus.
