He takes exception to the paean of praise now being sounded through the press and particularly to the words we used that "The sad tragedy recalls the line of Gray: 'The path of duty leads but to the grave'."

Our esteemed correspondent declares he does not see where "duty" comes in. The word "duty" should not come in the quotation. Nor did we intentionally put it there. It is there by mistake.

What we intended to say was that the tragedy recalled the words Gray actually used: "The path of glory leads but to the grave."

We made a slip in the quotation. We substituted unconsciously the word "duty" for "glory"; and with this amendment in form we adhere to the statement that the tragedy recalled in our mind the words of Gray: "The path of glory leads but to the grave."

How unconsciously a slip may be made, our respected correspondent will remember when he recalls the slip in a printed document recently copied in the press, which set forth the erroneous statement that "In England alone during the past year the Divorce Courts have thrown upon the world no less than seventy thousand children (70,000) orphaned; not by the hand of God; not by the death of their parents; but by the impious laws of divorce."

The particular extent of this enormity should have been attributed to the United States and not to England, where the number of divorces are usually between 800 and 900 a year.

ism has marred some of these quests, the fund of human knowledge has been considerably enlarged by these explorations. The indictment our correspondent prefers against Peary intrinsically sets forth the kind of knowledge that these explorations can and do furnish. Even were the indictment of Peary proved, it does not convict Scott. The guilt of the leader of one expedition is no proof of the guilt of a leader of a different expedition elsewhere.

The Scott expedition was assisted by the British Government and the Royal Geographical Society, for scientific purposes, and not to perform a mere stunt in pole hunting. It is inconceivable that either of these bodies would assist an expedition that was a mere sensational experiment undertaken either from motives of vanity or foolhardiness. Capt. Scott was a tried leader. His work has gained him the respect of explorers and nations. His end has caused a nation to grieve, and evoked the condolence of foreign people. He and his companions undertook the duty of exploring the Antarctic. In doing that duty they fell, and a nation mourns their fates and honors the sacrifice they made on the altar of duty.

**Mission Service.**

Unusually large congregations attended the Mission devotions at the R. C. Cathedral last night. Despite the extremely cold weather a large number of people came from different outlying settlements and every seat in the Church was filled, some having to stand. Following the recital of the Rosary, Rev. Fr. McPhillip ascended the pulpit and preached a touching and impressive discourse on the lives of girls and boys when blooming into womanhood and manhood. During the course of the sermon, the preacher referred at length to young people when approaching the sacrament of marriage. After the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was imposed, most of the congregation performed the Way of the Cross and the Sacrament of Penance. Early this morning the Cathedral was packed with people.
