NAVAL FIGHT IN NORTH SEA REPORTED.

LONDON, To-day.
That four German dreadnoughts and four German cruisers took part in Tuesday's engagement off the East coast of England is confirmed by the crew of the steam drifter Carrigill. According to the skipper of the drifter the German ships appeared through the mist about 16 miles East Northeast of Lewesteft at seven o'clock in the morning firing at the British cruiser Halycon, it lasted 15 minutes. The skipper also says that two British submarines, in addition to the D. 5 which was sunk by striking a mine, pursude the Germans.
