### WAR NEWS

NEW YORK  
Again, the French engaged in extremely heavy fighting around Verdun in the Verdun sector. The end of last week's attacks, Saturday, in the sector of Bois des Fossés, des Caurières, returned with renewed vigor. Hill 344. At some point, trenches were captured, but from there they were driven out and were entirely re-established. Fighting around Verdun, Sunday morning, the British troops have been successful attacks against the front line. Several yards were captured and taken. In Flanders, the are still roaring. The bombardment that has been a week, but as yet has not been loosed for the dash into the enemy. There has been a considerable German advance in the area, due in a large measure to the taking of the position particularly on the front.
