When Britain Ran Lotteries.

The recent decision of the House of Commons not to permit Government lotteries recalls the fact that lotteries were common in ancient Rome, and during the Middle Ages lotteries were utilised by the Italian merchants for the disposal of their goods. Some of the Italian States then adopted the lottery as a means of raising revenue, and the institution of State lotteries afterwards became very common and very popular throughout Europe. The earliest English State lottery of which there is any record was in 1569, when 40,000 chances were sold at ten shillings each, the drawing taking place at the west door of St. Paul's Cathedral. The prizes consisted of articles of plate, and the profits were employed for the repair of certain harbours. Early in the reign of Queen Anne private lotteries were suppressed "as public nuisances," but Government lotteries were still maintained, and from 1709 to 1824 considerable sums were annually raised in lotteries authorised by Act of Parliament. The average yearly profit to the Government from 1793 to 1824 was over £340,000. But on the ground of injury to public morals, lotteries of all kinds were abolished in England in 1826. Ireland is exempted from the ban.

Household Notes.

Celery tops may be used in soup. Green soap is very good for shampooing.

Use raisins in puddings whenever possible. Cover the rusted coat hanger with raffa.

Corn fritters can be made from canned corn. Narrow loaf pans insure thorough baking.

Use vinegar to soften the bottle of dried blue. A northern exposure is the best for a kitchen.

Keep track of the condition of your gas stove. When washing wool sweaters never rub them.

Scraps of bread may be toasted in a corn popper. It is dangerous to eat fish not thoroughly cooked.

Soak beans overnight before parboiling for baking. Every sanitary kitchen should have a dish-strainer. Iodine stains may be removed by strong ammonia water.
