The Coaker-Tories

Offer a Pig in a Bag to St. John's West.

The Tory shouters of Squires and Brownrigg are putting up the flimsy appeal that now that they have the Government it would be a grand thing for St. John's to re-elect the Tory puppets. That might have some effect were Squires and Brownrigg able to administer the Government in accordance with the desires of the people, but it loses force when it is quite apparent that every Government member must simply do as Coaker orders—no more, no less. Both Squires and Brownrigg are as two little boys in the hands of a cantankerous parent, just cuffed about as it were, and made to conform to the cranky whims of the frate and obtuse relative. Just what the voters of St. John's West can obtain in advantage from such a pair of political puppets may be classed as a pig in a bag kind of benefit, or that which a child obtains when he splits a nut with a hammer to see what makes the noise inside. These Tories proclaim that the electors should pass their votes in return for prospective Government favors which they pretend that Squires and Brownrigg will have at their disposal, whilst as a matter of fact Squires and Brownrigg will have to be on their p's and q's every day themselves to W. F. Coaker, if they even want to retain the jobs he now permits them to hold. Instead of being able to benefit the people of St. John's West, Squires and Brownrigg, if elected, would only be placed in the same position as they are now, that is of sitting silent and permitting the householders to be roasted by the Tory-Coaker profiteers. At the rate these parasites and vampires are going now, in the short time they have had the people at their mercy, it would not be an exaggeration to say that every family in St. John's will pass over to the profiteers in one or two months not less than 250 dollars blood money per family. That is

250 dollars per family in excess of what the ordinary cost of living would be were the profiteers prevented from fleecing the people. Assuming that there are 10,000 families over the whole of St. John's District, that means a blood money neture for St. John's alone of \$2,500,000 (Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars) per year, in return for the honor and glory of confirming the appointment of Squires as Colonial Secretary, and Brownrigg as Minister of Finance, with both subject to the orders of Coaker, and therefore most abject representatives of a city which has heretofore been so proud of the men that it elected.

Dilled down to a fine point, therefore, these Tory shouters ask the West End electors to fork out one-half of this Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars per year, an amount which in four years would total Five Million Dollars, and as an offset thereto the promise only of such Government pay and jobs at starvation wages that Coaker would permit them to dole out. It is therefore plain to be seen that it is just as ridiculous to expect the intelligent voter of St. John's West to have his family thus to suffer for the next four years in exchange for a sawdust offering, as it would be to expect the owner of a \$5,000 house to swap it for a hen's roost in Coaker's barn.

To sum up, the election of Squires and Brownrigg would cost the West End voters Five Million Dollars, a tax of 250 dollars per year for each family every one of the four years of Coaker-Tory rule that would then be apparent. It is not likely by the already high cost of living the West End voters are going to pledge themselves to indulge in this costly extra luxury to please Mr. Squires or Mr. Brownrigg who have nothing to offer in exchange except a half dozen tuppens.

happens jobs or such crumbs of Government pay as Coaker will permit them to distribute. The Tory shouters must be as mad as March hares to imagine that every voter in St. John's West can be influenced by the promise of a few paltry Government jobs or Coaker-Tory pickings. For one prospective job the Tory bosses have promised already about 500 men, and have deluded each with the idea that the job is his when the bye-election is over, whilst enough of orders for Government patronage have been promised to shopkeepers and farmers in St. John's West as would load a train of cars from here to Port aux Basques. All this is done to blind every possible voter in St. John's West, as if every man to whom a promise is made is too dense to see through the Tory game of deception, which would fleece the people out of Five Million Dollars blood money and bring about the ruin of St. John's.

Rev. Father Vaughan's Reply.

Directions for the Guidance of Electors in Voting.

Each elector, on entering the Booth Room where the poll is to be held shall declare his name, surname and addition.

After so doing he shall receive a Ballot Paper in the above form. Each elector, if required by the Deputy Returning Officer, the Poll Clerk, one of the Candidates, or one of their Agents, shall before receiving his Ballot Paper, take an oath of qualification.

The voter is to vote only for two candidates. After receiving his Ballot Paper, the voter shall go into one of the compartments, and with a pencil there provided, place a cross in the division containing the name or names of the Candidate or Candidates for whom he intends to vote, thus, X.

The voter will then fold the Ballot Paper so as to show a portion of the back only with the initials of the Deputy Returning Officer, and shall hand it so folded up to the Deputy Returning Officer, shall without unfolding it, ascertain that it is the Ballot Paper which he furnished to the elector, and then immediately place it in the Ballot Box. The voter shall forthwith leave the Polling.

If a voter inadvertently spoils a Ballot Paper he may return it to the Deputy Returning Officer, who will give him another. If a voter votes for more candidates than he is entitled to vote for, or places any mark on the Ballot Paper by which he can afterwards be identified, his vote will be void and will not be counted.

If a voter takes a Ballot or Ballot Paper out of the Polling station or fraudulently puts any other into the Ballot Box than the Paper given him by the Deputy Returning Officer, he will be subject to be punished by a fine of Five Hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labor.
