Union Men Called Out

RESULT OF RETRENCHMENT AT G. M. BARR'S. Yesterday morning some seventeer

employees of G. M. Barr's were in-formed by Mr. Canning, one of the directors of the firm, that owing to the present financial conditions the firm was not able to retain their services at the scheduled rate of wages. These men have been drawing regular wages at from \$21.00 to \$30.00 per week and many have been in the employ for a considerable period, some for as long as twenty years. At the present time there was absolutely no work for them to do, but believing that a half loaf was better than no bread, Mr. Canning offered to keep them in the employ at half their usual wage. All the employees, except one, were connected directly with the different unions and the matter was forthwith brought to the attention of their executives. The result was that the men of the L. S. P. U. affected were called on to leave the premises, and also the Coopers' Union men, this in virtue of the principles of both unions. Seen by a Telegram representative this morning, Mr. Canning said that they had not then enough work to keep the men going for one hour a day, but that the firm would pay full union wages for hourly men when

work was available. The reduction applied to permanent hands and up to New Year they had a staff on their wharves and in their fish stores drawing a large aggregate wage, now they were unable to meet the outlay, and instead of sacrificing some and retaining the few, retrenchment had to be

applied all around. It was the firm's regret that it had to be done, but no other course was left open. All these men had shared in the firm's prosper-ity and at least they should be considerate in the times of adversity. To-day all their stores were locked up and the men are without any employ

Delegate Coady of the L. S. P. U. called at Barr's premises yesterday morning and was told the story of the men whose wages had been reduced. He later consulted with Mr. Canning and explained to him that it was against union principles to have any the schedule rates. He suggested that gratefully to acknowledge the receipt nen of the union work at less than the men be employed at so many of fifty dollars, a bequest of the late hours each day to make the reduction James Finlay. proposition. Mr. Coady was then obliged to call the L. S. P. U. men off the premises, and they left in a body. Union men are of opinion that if the principle is allowed to be applied at the premises of Mr. Barr all other firms will follow, suit.
