

> The Bristol Reform Bill Riots.

Of the many disgraceful riot throughout England attendant upon the rejection of the first Reform Bill by the House of Lords, the outbreak at Bristol was the most destructive. The pretext was supplied by the arrival, in the course of the duties, of Sir Charles Wetherell, the Recorder, who was prominent as an Anti-Reformer; but was due wholly to the incapacity of the magistrates and to the inexplicable inaction of the officer in ommand of the troops, Colonel Brereton, that the explosion was so formid able. From Saturday, October 29, 1831 when the trouble began, until the morning of Tuesday, November 1, when troops from all quarters poured into the city and the neighbourhood, the mob worked its will, practically unchecked, and pillage, violence, and arson were suffered to rage. Most of Queen's Square, then the best residential part of Bristol, was burned down, only two houses on the west side which is easily prepared in a few distribution. escaping. The Custom house, the tollgates, on the bridge leading to the Pi quay, and the prisons were destroyed wholly or in part. The Bishop's Palace, on College Green, was gutted, although fortunately the Cathedral was no more than scorched in places.
