Rowe vs. GRAND TRUNK COMPANY-An action was tried at the Toronto Assies on Tuesday, brought by Edmund Rowe, to recover compensation for injuries sustained by him on the 13th of February 1865, when the train, in which he had ta ken passage from Guelph to Toronto, ran off the track about a mile and a half east of the former station, the car in which the laintiff was being thrown down an embankment of 25 or 30 feet, where it renained bottom up. The damages were laid at £5,000. The case was formerly tried and a verdict rendered for the plain tiff of \$300. On application of the Com-pany a new trial [the present] was grant-

ed. The defendants, through their agent, Mr Spicer, had given the plaintiff \$50 as compensation for his injuries, and the action turned entirely upon the validity of this settlement, as it occurred four days after the accident, and it was contended by Rowe's counsel that he was then of un-
