The Voters' Lists.

For the information of voters in the Centre and North Ridings, we would state that at the approaching elections, the Voters' lists of all the municipalities, except Arthur Village, for last year, will be used. The Voters' list of that village for this year was the only one returned to the Clerk of the Peace in time to be used, as by law they are required to be in his hands thirty days before the date of the writ for the elections, which was issued on the 16th of July.

The Centre Riding.

The work goes bravely on in the Centre Riding. The more meetings Dr. Orton holds the less the electors think of him, and the more of Mr. Ross. Dr. Orton's "bummers" who follow him to all his meetings and do his dirty work, are getting to be notorious, and the head bummer from the Herald office is earning for himself a notoriety which is far from being enviable. ELECTION NEWS.

John A.'s organ, the Leader, is now denouncing "the low Irish."

The Writs for South Wellington and South Waterloo Elections have not yet been issued.

The Hamilton Times says the trust of the people in South Wentworth is rising to a high point. The great and growing strength of Mr. Rymal's position is admitted on all hands. His frank statement of principle has secured to him hosts of friends. The unjust canvass made against him by those who represent the most retrograde elements of society is causing the better class of electors to resolve to take care of Rymal's interests and help him on to victory.

Says the Galt Reformer:—The Tory Guelph Herald, which undertook some time ago to "reconstruct" the representation of this section of Canada, has not made its appearance in this part of the country lately. What's the matter? Has it given up the task in despair, or has its superabundance of gas sent the whole thing into smithereens? We rather think the Herald man finds it harder to proselytize others than was the case with himself.

The London Free Press is furnishing its readers with reliable election intelligence. It places Messrs Young and Bowman in its list of Tory Candidates. If we are to judge of the remainder by this list must prove interesting.

Beaty's prophecies have been so outraged by the prospects of being defeated by a "Fenian sympathizer," as he calls O'Donohue, that he is carrying out his threat of publishing the names of the latter's central committee in the Leader.

The spittoon party have secured another private letter, which they made public at the North Norfolk nomination. The Party of Progress is progressing admirably as shoulder-hitters and spies.

In Hamilton, Sir John said he had to work more than nine hours, and in Kingston he went on the strike. We suppose that, on these grounds, his organs will urge that he is the workman's candidate.

The writ for Centre Toronto has been received, and is in the hands of Walter G. Lee.

Some of Sir John's supporters in Toronto say that in the event of Sir John's defeat at Kingston, the nomination for Centre Toronto will be brought on at once, and that Mr. Shanly will retire to make place for him.

Mr Currie's election for the borough of Niagara is now considered safe, as a great many old Tories will vote against the Government.

In Welland, a great many of Street's old supporters will vote against him, and the others will not vote at all.

The Montreal Gazette appears to think that in opposing Sir John A. Macdonald in Kingston, the Reformers are damaging constitutional gov-

ernment. We presume, then, that Sir John's defeat would be the ruin of constitutional government. The opponents of the Government in England never hesitate to try and defeat the Premier; but our Sir John is to be held sacred. What there is in either his morals or his manners to make him sacred we fail to see.

The nomination for the North Riding of Bruce takes place at Port Elgin on the 9th August, and the polling on the 16th. There are only two candidates in the field—Mr Sproat in the interest of the Government, and Mr Gillies, Opposition.

The writ for the election in North Huron has been received by W. Thays, Registrar, who has issued his proclamation in accordance therewith. The nomination will be held at Wingham on the 12th of August, and the polling on the 19th.

SOUTH WATERLOO.—The Galt Reformer says the edict has gone forth that Mr. Young must be opposed in South Waterloo. Sir Francis, Sir John & Co. are feeling the effects of Mr. Young's addresses to the electors in different parts of Ontario, and out of revenge have ordered that a candidate must be brought out to oppose him. There is not a Tory in South Waterloo who has the temerity to try conclusions with the Reform Candidate, but the leaders are Mephistophelian, and are urging a vain and superannated government official (Hon. George Alexander, of Woodstock), to go through the farce of a contest. If he does he will get an awful beating.

The Rev. Mr. Knight has been tried before the Free Church Presbytery of Dundee, Scotland, at a special meeting, for preaching in the Chapel of the Rev. J. C. Martineau, the well-known Unitarian of London. Mr. Knight admitted the offence, and justified it by saying he had broken no church law. He believed himself perfectly free to declare the truth of God in any place, at any time, to any audience he might be privileged to address. He also stated that he gave up none of his opinions, and made no secret of his differences with the Unitarians in his sermon. A motion was carried, with but one dissentient, censuring him, requiring him to repudiate the Unitarian body, as forming no part of the Church of Christ, and enjoining him not to repeat the act, under pain of exposing himself to the highest censure of the Church. Mr. Knight has not yet given in his answer. His congregation identify themselves with him.

An Oregon correspondent says:—This is a lovely country, as it lies unrolled before us—the green fields and forests glowing, and the wide rivers parking under the bright light of a June sun. All of the Oregonians feel its influence, and all praise the beauty of their land, which to their minds is without a peer.
