PREMPEH TRYING TO TEMPORIZE

London, Dec. 36.-Up to the present everything in conection with the British expedition being sent against King Prempeh appears to have gone well and smoothly. The main body of the expeditionary force left Cape Coast yesterday and the advance guard has already reached the River Prah, which has been bridged. When this work was accomplished the scouting parties were sent forward into the

enemy's country.

King Prempeh has sent several temporizing messages to the British au-

thorites, but no notice has been taken of them, and it is generally believed that he will fight when the expedition enters the bush.

General Sir Francis Scott, inspector-general of the Gold Coast forces, accompanied by his staff, which includes Prince Henry of Battenberg and Prince Christian Victor of Schleswig. It tein, started for the front yesterday.

BRITAIN AND RUSSIA

May Unite to Erect a Solution of the East-

London Dec. 30.—Developments in the East point to an entente between Russia and Great Britain under which Russia will temporarily occupy the diturbed provinces in Asia Minor, Great Britain co-operating with Russia on the seaboard. Russian overtures to this effect are undoubtedly before Lord Salisbury. The news yesterday from St. Petersburg adds to the relief

that such negotiations are in progress.

The departure of the Russian Black Sea squadron from Sebastopol on Dec. 15 fer an ungnown destination, is much commented upon, and has caused sone lively speculation as to its ultimate destination.

The apathy of Europe and America.

The apathy of Europe and America, so far as the gevernments are concerned, is almost as surprising as the cruelty of the Turks. There is still talk of committing reforms to these murderous Turks. They will take care unless Europe intervenes sppedily that there shall be left no Armenians to participate in reforms.

The Duke of Argyle has written a letter, in which he comments on the absence of a genuine European concert on the Armenian question. He says, with reference to Asia Minor, that if a combination of the powers cannot be effected, Great Britain must give up her jealous es and invite Russia to do what she can accomplish with ease.

Hamilton, Dec. 30.—The formality of blowing in the smelting works took place this afternoon, before a gathering of several hundred people, com-prising the prominent business men of the city and numerous prominent peo ple from outside. A special train conveyed those present to the works at 2 o'clock and shortly after John H. Tilden, president of the company, briefly addressed the gathering on the importance of lighting the first smelting works blast furnace in the province, after which Mrs. Tilden, amidst the cheering of the crowd, with torch in hand, ignited the fuel. Then the crowd adjourned to the engine house, A. T. Wood, a shareholder, addressed the gathering at length, pointing out how that he had become convinced that the smelting works can be operate.
