HOW LONDON LOST.

Special to The Advertiser. Guelph, June 10.—A small crowd witnessed one of the most exciting and closely contested games of the season here this afternoon, when the Big Red Guelph batted for supremacy on the Green.

Sayers, the Leafs' latest acquisition, was in the box and while he has undoubtedly wonderful speed and great curves, it cannot be said he altogether charmed the fans with his work. The Londons were evidently in great batting form, and they rapped out the ball in a most annoying and certainly surprising way to the natives, who expected a comparatively easy victory.

For the first three innings, third base was as far as a leaf man could get, while clean hitting gave London a run on the third and fourth. In the fifth, they were blanked, while the Leafs' errors were made, when on his and a couple of errors and inept plays, they secured two runs in the sixth and seventh the home team were blanked; in fact they only hit Kerbow at all hard in the eighth inning, when they unexpectedly batted out five runs, after London had apparently won the game by their hard hitting in the seventh, netting four, and another in the eighth.

London failed to score in the ninth, and the score being a tie, the excitement was at fever heat, while the small attendance was straining their eyes and ears to the limit in a vain hope of giving the victors the "rattle". Molloy led off with a single, but he died at first, and Sayers died out. The chunky little Frenchman then selected a hickory, and picking out a nice one, bamboozled it over the fence, and won the game.

At the end of the seventh inning, with the score 4 to 3 in London's favor, the people were looking very blue, and had abandoned all hope of overhauling such a lead at the late stage of the game. But Kerbow revived hope when he allowed Vigneaux and Green to walk in the eighth. Molloy then made a two-bagger and Sayers a single. O'Brien also hit for a base, and Fletcher sent the ball to center field for two bags.

London's clean hitting gave them the lead, and the Leafs' timely rapping out of kicks on both sides, and in several cases there was cause for hope. But he stuck to his decisions, and on the whole favored neither team. Score:

London, June 11.—The fourth biennial sale of the Prince of Wales' Hacks and harness horses was held yesterday afternoon at the prince's stud farm at Woburn, near Sandringham, Norfolk. The sale began at 1 o'clock, and was preceded by refreshments served to the visitors and attending buyers, most of whom had come down from London by the Great Eastern Railway during the forenoon.

The sale was a great treat outside the stables.
