London, April 30.-Comment on the terrible fire which swept Ottawa on Thursday is general among the newspapers here. The Morning Post says that if Ottawa needs help sne has to make her necessities known, and the children of the empire will somehow or other manage to see that they are promptly met. The Daily News says: "Let us take only the satisfaction that a great sorrow like this can yield; satisfaction promptly showing Canadians that their sympathy with us is not forgotten when they turn to require sympathy from us." The Daily Chronicle says: "The Ottawa calamity would have evoked moment, when the relations between Englishmen and Canadians are tionally intimate." EFFECT ON LUMBER MARKET. New York, April 30.-Lewis A. Hall, president of the Export Lumber Company of New York, Boston and Ottawa, which company had a million dollars' worth of its lumber burned in the Ot-

tawa fire, says: 'The destruction of a large amount of white pine lumber at Ottawa, which is reported as amounting to from 150, 000,000 to 200,000,000 feet, together with the loss of mill capacity of between 200,000,000 and 250,000,000 feet per annum, will have a greater effect upon the white pine and spruce lumber markets than it would have had at any other period within the past ten years. Not only does it take out of the market for the next twelve months over 400,000,000 feet of lumber, principally white pine, but it does this at a time when the demand was increasing altogether out of proportion to the avail-

able supply. "I have just received the following telegram from our agent in Ottawa: 'Cancel all orders possible for common lumber in the States. It is necessary for us to have this lumber here.' Owing to the great demand for lumber in Canada it looks to me as if lumber will have to be shipped from the United States to Canada to supply a part of

he immediate demand."

THE SICK MAN AND UNCLE SAM

DISASTER AT PARIS.

Paris, April 30 .- An accident yesterday within the exposition grounds caused the death of at least six persons. About 40 others were injured. A temporary bridge, unable to withstand the Sunday crowd, broke. The accident threw a pall over the happiness of an immense throng, who had profited by the magnificent weather

to visit the exposition. The gay crowd was passing along the avenue and some hundred or more persons were walking beneath bridge, when suddenly an ominous crash was heard. Before those underneath could turn aside, the structure fell with a fearful crash, burying nearly 50.
