

They Attacked the Garrison at Close Quarters

And Were Repulsed, Sufposition was reached, when a hot fire was unexpectedly opened on the advancing column. The engagement began at 4:15 a.m. At 7 a.m., after a

Gen. Gatacre Met a Serious Reverse at Stormberg.

Surprised by the Enemy After a Memorable Night March.

British Forces Led the Wrong Way by Treacherous Guides.

Canadian Contingent Likely to Have Hot Work.

Complete Success of the Last Sortie From Ladysmith - The Garrison and Residents Greatly Encouraged.

Cape Town, Dec. 10.-It was reported here that the Boers attacked Kimberley at close quarters last night, but were repulsed with heavy loss.

Kimberley reported all quiet there up to Dec. 7, and that the pressure of the investment is diminished.

THE CAPTURE OF BOER GUNS. London, Monday, Dec. 11.-A special dispatch has been received from Ladysmith, by way of Frere, in reference to the war office account, cabled Saturday, of the capture of the Boer guns lery, reconnoitered in the direction of Pepworth Hill, with a view of cutting off the Boer retreat, but he found the positions still strongly held. The 18th Hussars, pushing forward, drew a parade afterward, Gen. White thanked Gen. Hunter and all engaged, especially Major Henderson, for brilliant work.

BOER REPORT OF THE AFFAIR. Boer Head Laager, Ladysmith, Friday, Dec. 8.—The British troops made a sortie between 1 and 2 o'clock in the morning. They crawled up a ravine and stormed and carried Lombard's Kop, which was held by the Boers, and on which were placed a Creusot gun and a howitzer. These guns were destroyed with dynamite. The British captured a Maxim gun and then re-

The Lancers, Hussars and Guards made a sortie west of Ladysmith at daybreak under cover of a heavy artillery fire, which the Boers returned briskly. The British afterwards re-turned to Ladysmith. The Boer losses are reported to have been slight.

Major Erasnrus and Lieut. Malan will be tried by courtmartial in connection with the loss of the guns.

BRITISH REVERSE

Gen. Gatacre's Column Defeated at Stormberg.

London, Monday, Dec. 11.-The was office here publishes the following dispatch from Gen. Forestier-Walker, at Cape Town: Gatacre reports:

"Deeply regret to inform you that I met with a serious reverse in the attack on Stormberg. I was misled as to the enemy's position by the guides, and found impracticable ground.

He had 2,000 men, including the Northumberland Fusil-iers, the Royal Irlsh Rifles and two batteries of artillery. The British were unmolested by the Boers until the Boer

to co-operate with Gatacre." RECONNOISSANCE IN FORCE. Molteno, Cape Colony, Sunday, Dec. 10-5:30 p.m.—Gen. Gatacre's movement may be termed a reconnoissance in force. Its object was to ascertain the strength of the position of the Boeis, who were strongly entrenched along the Stormberg range. He left Putter's Kraal shortly after noon yesterday, with a fighting force slightly over 4,000 men. Leaving Molteno at 9 last evening, he made a memorable night march over the rocks and veldt. There was no sound except a steady tramp, and there was no distinguishing light, the bright moon having gone down about half-past eleven. The column arrived safely within a couple of miles of its destination, the only incidents of the march being an occasional sudden call of "Halt!" under the belief that the

Boers were near.

SURPRISED. Suddenly a terrific fire opened simultaneously on the British front and right flank. The Royal Irish Rifles, which formed the advance, sought shelter behind a neighboring kopje, and were speedily joined by the renear Pepworth Hill. BOERS HAD MACHINE GUNS. It was soon discovered, however. that the Boers had machine guns well placed, and the British were compelled to face a terrific fire. Finding it impossible to hold the positions in the face of an enemy apparently superior in position, numbers and artillery, the British retired on Molteno, the Boers following up the retirement closely, and bringing two big guns to bear on

the retreating column. LED INTO A TRAP.

London, Monday, Dec. 11.—The Times publishes the following dispatch from Molteno: "Gen. Gatacre attempted to assault the Boer position at Stormberg at dawn today (Sunday). Our retirement was effected in excellent order, there being no hurry even at the most critical time. The Northumberlands and Irish Rifles behaved as if on review. I fear our losses are heavy. guns we had to abandon. A SERIOUS MATTER.

London, Dec. 11-4 a.m.-It is hard-ly too much to regard Gen. Gatacre's repulse near Stormberg as the most serious defeat British arms have yet sustained in the whole campaign. ready the official advices show that two men were killed, nine officers and seventeen men were wounded, and nine officers and 596 officers are missing who are undoubtedly prisoners in the hands of the Boers-that the supplementary list of casualties is awaited with serious misgivings. It is also feared that there were serious losses

of guns and equipment. EFFECT ON THE DUTCH.

The most serious aspect of the affair is the effect it is likely to have on the Dutch in Cape Colony, who have been wavering as to whether to cast in their let with the Boers. Hosts of the northern farmers are now likely to join the rebellion.

The defeat is also serious because it will delay the junction of Gen. Gatacre with Gen. French at Naauw Port. The plan was for their combined forces to relieve the pressure on Lord Me-thuen's column. The disclosure of such a strong force at Stormberg was quite unexpected. Doubtless Gen. Gatacre was the victim of

LYDDITE SHELLS.

The Pretoria reports of renewed fighting at Modder River originated from the fact that the British, with a team of 32 oxen, hauled a naval gun to the top of a high ridge north of Mod-der River town, whence they fired lyddite shells on the Boer position at a range of 6,700 yards, where the enemy was apparently constructing an em-placement for a 40-pounder. The lyd-dite shells appeared to do immense damage. The Boers retired, but the incident is interesting, as showing that the Boers are still in position quite close to Modder River. Mr. Churchill had applied to Gen. Buller with a view of getting an exchange. This has been a quiet day here. The health of the troops is excellent.

GUNBOATS FOR SOUTH AFRICA. London, Dec. 11.-Two shallowdraught river gunboats are being prepared at Chatham for service in South Africa. Each will carry two sixpounder quick-firers and four Maxims. The transport Majestic will sail from Liverpool at noon on Dec. 13, for South Africa. She will call at St. Vincent, and is expected to reach Cape Town Dec. 28. She will carry the mail and parcels for the soldiers. The hospital ship Princess of Wales has returned to Sheerness because of damaged machinery

Russia is sending Gen. Guerko, of the general staff, as attache at the Boer head laager. Twenty-four cars, containing 750,000 pounds of canned beef, were started for the Transvaal yesterday by Libby, McNeill & Libby, Chicago, on a ten days' rush order from the English Government.
