A LOCAL BUDGET.

—The special committee of the London Methodist Conference will meet in Wellington Street Church here on Thursday, Oct. 24, at 10:30 a.m.

HAMILTON'S CLAIM DAMAGE FROM THE CITY.

Want City Money for Injuries to Person or Property.

No More Work on Streets To Be Undertaken—Sewer Funds Applied to Street Cleaning.

At the board of works meeting last night three claims for damages were considered, but the committee fought shy of definite disposal of any of them. Two were referred to the engineer for a report and one was sent to council, without a recommendation. Two motions were passed, one taking \$500 from sewers and culverts fund, and placing it to the credit of street cleaning, and the other ordering that no further work on streets or roads be begun except in cases of absolute necessity. The other business transacted was of purely routine character. Those present were Chairman Winnett, Ald. Olmsted, Parnell and Campbell. Engineer Graydon and Secretary Bell.

J. C. Judd appeared in connection with the claim for damages of Mrs. Sarah Ann Kenneally, owing to injuries sustained last Labor Day through falling over a loose board in the sidewalk on Ridout street south. Engineer Graydon reported that the sidewalk was not defective, and that he did not consider the city liable for damages. Mr. Judd stated that he himself saw the loose board in the sidewalk and also grass growing over the walk the morning after the accident. He said Mrs. Kenneally did not desire a lawsuit, but simply wished to be reimbursed for her outlay on medical attendance and such other expenses as she incurred because of the accident. The doctor's bill was \$10. Mr. Judd suggested the offer of \$15 or \$20.

Ald. Parnell and Chairman Winnett both expressed the opinion that the case did not warrant the outlay of the citizens' money.

The committee decided to refer the matter to the council without recommendation.

Buchner & Campbell wrote on behalf of Detective Robert B. Thompson, half of Detective Robert B. Thompson, driving against a hydrant on Becher street.

The matter was referred to the engineer for a report.

Fraser & Moore's claim on behalf of property owners of Wellington street north for damages caused to property by undug hole of sidewalk, was referred to the engineer for a report.

Sufficiently signed petitions for cement walks on south side of Philip street between York street and the L. E. and D. R. R. tracks; on south side Hamilton road, from Inkerman to Mamelon street, and on east side of the tracks, were ordered to be advertised.

Ald. Parnell moved that \$500 be taken from the sewers and culverts fund and placed to the credit of street cleaning appropriation. The motion carried.

Ald. Parnell further moved that after the work at present in hand he be permitted to have the express order of the committee. Also carried.

Half of block of content walk on the south side of Hamilton street, west of the River Thames, will be constructed at once.

The pay sheet totaled \$235 75.

GENERAL CONFERENCE

Of the Methodist Church Meets in Winnipeg in 1902.

Toronto, Oct. 18.—The conference committee of the Methodist Church, at a session to decide on the place of meeting of the next general conference, discussed at considerable length the claims of Montreal and Winnipeg, and finally, by a vote of 11 to 6, decided in favor of Winnipeg, where the conference will meet in September, 1902. Dr. Carman presided at the meeting.

The court of appeal of the church rendered decisions on two questions brought up. The first was from London conference as to whether the principal of Alma College, St. Thomas, and evangelists there were in the active work of the ministry. Dr. Carman, general superintendent, had decided that they were, and appeal was made from his decision.

In the second case, the president of the Nova Scotia conference had refused to put a motion for the ordination of a hired local preacher who had been appointed to a mission. The court of appeal sustains the president in his refusal.

A BANK MESSENGER AND \$50,000 MISSING

A Trusted Toronto Agent Accused of Embezzlement and Forgery.

New York, Oct. 18.—The Commercial Advertiser says: A remarkable story of the disappearance of a bank messenger and George Armitage, with over \$50,000 in checks and drafts, came to light today. The new Amsterdam National Bank is the institution concerned, and the officials are convinced that their employee has been foully dealt with.

George Armitage had been messenger at the New Amsterdam Bank for some time, and in the course of his tour of collection has carried many thousands of dollars to and fro in the busy streets of the city, always arriving at the bank, which is under the Metropolitan Opera House, on time, and never causing a moment's uneasiness to the officials. On Tuesday last he went out on one of his usual missions, the amount which he was to collect being variously stated at from \$25,000 to \$50,000. He failed to return to the bank and has not been seen since.

Yesterday Currie, Gunther & Eyrle issued a writ in the county court on behalf of Pike & Co. against the Bank of Hamilton. The claim is for \$300, the amount of a forged check which Morrison is said to have cashed at that institution. If Pike & Co. are successful in this case they will proceed against a number of other institutions at which Morrison is said to have cashed forged drafts.

ROUGH ON LAKE SUPERIOR.
Fort William, Oct. 18.—The steamer Bannockburn and barges Dunmore and Winnipeg, arrived yesterday morning after a stormy passage, taking twelve hours longer than usual from the Soo to this place. The advance has not yet arrived. It has been a rough and stormy week on Lake Superior.

SOUTH WATERLOO LIBERALS.
New Hamburg, Ont., Oct. 18.—A convention of South Waterloo Liberals met yesterday to select a candidate for the Local Legislature. Dr. Adam Thompson was unanimously chosen as the state ticket, and Premier Ross arrived in town by the 4 p.m. train, and was met at the station by a committee and was escorted in a carriage to the Commercial Hotel, preceded by the premier addressed the delegates and the public in the William Tell Hall.
