ATTORNEY-GENERAL GIBSON DEFENDS THE JUDICIARY

In a Vigorous Speech He Scores Mr. Whitney

FOR ATTACK ON COMMISSION

Mr. Charlesworth Apologizes for Bar of the House for Note to Mr. Pettipiece.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, June 24. — Hon. J. M. Gibson's address in the Legislature today was one of the finest efforts yet heard in the debate. He ably answered the carping criticisms of the Opposition on the judges' report, and showed plainly that the conclusion reached by the commissioners was the only one warranted by the evidence.

The speakers on the Opposition side were Messrs. Hoyle and Hanna. The former drew largely on ancient history for his material, while the latter's speech was a vigorous and diffusive one.

When the House resumed in the afternoon, the Attorney-General, rising, said he understood that Mr. Charlesworth wished to make a statement at the bar of the House respecting the matter that had been complained of. Sergeant-at-Arms Blackmeyer then escorted Mr. Charlesworth to the bar, where he read the following statement:

"Mr. Speaker, — With reference to the letter addressed by me to the member for East Lambton, on which I appear, in justification, I can say that the communication was an attack on his ideas as a journalist, and not upon his conduct as a member of the House; that it was a personal communication passing between old and intimate acquaintances, containing but one offensive word, which I should not have used under any circumstances, and that it was written under what I deemed extreme provocation. Since I am advised that it was an offense to the general honor of the House, I desire to apologize for it, and regret this occurrence."

The Speaker, on behalf of the Assembly, accepted the apology, and expressed the hope that no similar occurrence would ever take place in the House.

session, Mr. Hanna said the signing of the agreement in Mr. Aylesworth's office by Mr. Gamey was the culmination of the negotiations that started with Cap Sullivan's midnight visit to Mr. Gamey's home. RIOTING IN RICHMOND

Guards Fire into Mob of Strike Sympathizers, Wounding Six.

Richmond, Va., June 25.—Six men were wounded, two of them seriously, by street railway guards, who fired into a crowd of strike sympathizers outside the city limits. Two of them are seriously hurt, but appeared in the crowd. Exciting scenes were enacted in the east end, where efforts were made to operate the street cars. Finally, the guards, under the protection of the military, all sorts of missiles were hurled at the cars, and obstructions placed on the tracks. The cars, under the pilot of a detachment of the howitzers, with a galling gun, were taken to the barracks. Many troops are en route here. It is proposed in the event that the military are unable at that time to cope with the mob to order out the fire department and have streams from the hoses played upon disorderly gatherings.
