THE SMALLPOX IN ONTARIO. Serious Outbreak of Disease in the Province. 10 DEATHS SO FAR IN EPIDEMIC. Prompt Action in Vaccination is Necessary—Scarlet Fever Also Epidemic.

Toronto, Feb. 12.—At the quarterly meeting of the Provincial Board of Health yesterday, the principal topic of discussion was the present outbreak of smallpox and scarlet fever, both of which were an unusually virulent type.
