## TO GET HEAT WITHOUT FUEL

Patent Office of United States Besieged With Brilliant Devices for Producing Heat.

Washington, Oct. 12.-Patent officials here have hitherto paid but little attention to schemes for manufacturing substitutes for coal. There have been many devices and formulas for products that would serve as a fuel substitute, but in most cases they have been worthless, costing more than the average coal. With anthracite at \$20 a ton, soft coal scarce and advancing in price, and wood on the boom in the market, there has been a throng of inventors at the patent office with applications for patents on all sorts of artifical fuel. There has also been a rush of inventors with plans for converting grates and burners so that they may be adapted for fuel oil and liquid substitute. Out of the plans offered it is the hope of the patent officials that some scheme may be found which will serve as a substitute for anthracite coal and remove the people from the nightmare of a coal famine for the coming winter.

A relative of Thomas Edison, the famous electrical expert, is in the field with what is probably the most unique scheme to rid the public of the bur-dens of the long coal strike. If his plan should be found practical every housewife will be able to go out into the front yard each morning and gather the chief component of the Edison substitute for fuel. This is nothing more nor less than grass. The inventor is Simon Ogden Edison, of East Orange, N. J. He promises to convert the natural or dried fiber of all kinds of grasses, grain, corn, su-gar-cane, etc., into artificial fuel. He has obtained a patent on the process for treating such materials by which he claims to be able to produce a smoldering flame similar to that resulting from burning coal, instead of a blaze caused by the ignition and consumption of wood.

A COMBUSTIBLE BRIQUET. E. J. Mead, of Philadelphia, has a patent on a plan to make a combustible briquet from comminuted coal, coke or other burnable material by the use of molasses as a binding agent. Molasses has been employed for this purpose before, but there are certain objections to it, one of which is that will usually disintegrate on coming in contact with water or moisture. Mead's process avoids this result by heating the molasses when used as a

Lord Strath-cona is in high favor with the British Government, which in view of his services, is hardly in a position to turn him down. As a result Mrs. Brown will probably, in the long run, secure her husband's one-third of the full amount of the judgment with interest. Brown had not been in Spokane for over a year, but he has hosts of warm friends here. Those who knew him best say he did not leave much of his fortune beyond his interest in the judgment against the Transvael Government. Mrs. Brown is a sister of Mrs. H. B. Luhn.


