

#### CARRIED DESPATCHES IN 1837

Mrs. Marie Doty, of this city, who passed away as a result of her recent accident, has some very interesting events connected with her past life. She was born in 1821, near Aylmer, Ont., and was a daughter of the late Capt. Cook.

During the rebellion of 1837 she carried very important dispatches on horseback, under cover of night, from the troops stationed at her father's house, to officers at outlying points. The only road led through dense woods, and on her way she was pursued by wolves, barely escaping with her life. She afterwards married Henry Finch, who also took part in the rebellion. Later in life, arter Mr. Finch' death, she married the late Mr. J. Doty. Only one sister and brother remain out of a family of sixteen. The funeral takes place on Thursday afternoon, the 16th inst.
