CANADA AND THE LAKE TRAFFIC.

The Government of the Dominion fully recognizes the great opportunities which exist for the development of trade between the shores of Lake Canada by way of the great lakes. This was clearly demonstrated by the Minister of Public Works in a recent

At the present time the haroor at Port Arthur is being deepened. It is already down to a depth of 22 feet, and the intention is to deepen it to 25 feet, so as to give accommodation to the largest lake steamers which can go to any port on the western shores of Lake Superior. 
