DEATH ENDS HIS FIGHT FOR LOVE

Italian Terminates His Battle 'Twixt Duty and the Woman.

New York, Nov. 11.—Giovanni de Chichida, who until he was compelled to choose between love and duty was a lieutenant in the Italian army, committed suicide in the Tombs today. His imprisonment had been brought about by his brother, Luigi, a banker, of this city. The latter believed Giovanni insane.

According to the police records, he fell in love in Italy, and, unable as an army officer to support his wife as he wished, deserted and sought his fortune as a cowboy in the American west. The venture was not a success, and finally, leaving his wife in their new home, he came to New York to get a fresh start. Again unsuccessful and penniless, he asked financial aid of his brother.

The meeting of the brothers was not amicable, and at a second interview Giovanni was alleged to have peremptorily demanded first \$1,000 and then \$2,000 from the banker. He exhibited a revolver, and it was charged, threatened his brother's life. The banker wished to have Giovanni detained as insane, but the court would not entertain the charge, and the former soldier was held for trial on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. In the Tombs Giovanni became despondent, complained bitterly of former friends and constantly grieved for his girl-wife left alone in the west.

When the doors were opened to permit the prisoners to go to the yard for their daily exercise today, Giovanni, who occupied a cell on the third tier, stepped quickly out on the balcony and then sprang on the guard-rail. He dived headforemost to the stone flagging 25 feet below. Several hundred prison companions witnessed his death.

CUNARD LINE MAY OPERATE FOR G.T.R.

Rumored That Steamers Will Be Placed on Both the Atlantic and Pacific.

Liverpool, Nov. 11.—Negotiations are on foot between the Cunard Line and the Grand Trunk Railroad of Canada for joint handling of Canadian passenger and freight traffic.

The scheme, which is still in its initial stage, contemplates running a line of Cunard steamers direct from Liverpool to Canada, and a Cunard Line service from the Pacific coast to Japan, China and Australia.

London, Nov. 11.—Mr. Norman, the secretary of the Grand Trunk Railroad, says he has heard nothing whatever regarding negotiations between the Cunard Line and the Grand Trunk.

London, Nov. 11.—A Liverpool wire says negotiations have begun between the Cunard Line and the G.T.R. for a joint scheme to handle Canadian passenger and freight traffic. The scheme provides for a direct Cunard service from Liverpool to Canada and also steamers between the Pacific coast and Japan, China and Australia.

Montreal, Nov. 11.—In regard to the story that the Cunard Line were about to run to Canada and have made special arrangements with the Grand Trunk, Mr. C. M. Hays, general manager of the company, states that he has heard nothing of it. "I know nothing whatever about the matter," was Mr. Hays' brief response when questioned this morning.

PRIVATE LEGISLATION

Notice of Sixty-seven Bills To Come Before Parliament.

Ottawa, Nov. 11.—Notice has already been given of 67 bills for the approaching session, so that the private legislation will be considerable. Among the notices are applications for four new banks, one in Edmonton, one at Montreal, one in Winnipeg, and one in Vancouver. There are three fire insurance companies, one being the Standard Mutual, Toronto. Then there are the Security Life and Standard Plate Glass Insurance Company. Five of these are from Toronto, one from Winnipeg, one from Minto, Man., one from Parry Sound and one from Tecumseh.

SAYS B. C. DIVORCES ARE NOT VALID

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 11.—By a judgment of Judge Clemens made here today a number of persons in this province are placed in an uncomfortable position to say embarrassing position.

Judge Clemens announced that in his opinion divorces granted in British Columbia are invalid, and those who have again entered into matrimony after being freed from their former helpmates are liable to prosecution for bigamy.

The decision of the judge is a great surprise, and affects some who are high in the social life of the province and prominent in business circles.

If the court of appeal upholds the verdict some interesting actions are certain to result.

HAZERS PUNISHED.

Paris, Nov. 11.—The officials of the University of Paris have ordered the medical school to be closed until Jan. 1, on account of recent disorderly demonstrations of students against two provincial professors.

BILLION DOLLARS SOCIETY INSURANCE

Weather Insurance Is Increasing—Fire Companies Cover Big Risks.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—Almost a billion and a half dollars. That is a vast sum, but it represents the amount of society insurance in force in the Province of Ontario on Dec. 31, 1906, according to the report of J. Howard Hunter, registrar of insurance, just issued.

It was carried by 26 societies having a membership of 273,262 in Ontario, but a total number of certificates of \$91,434.

The number of claims to mature in 1906 was 1,769 in Ontario, meaning a payment of \$2,390,452 in insurance benefits, and \$129,777 in disability benefits. The total assets of the societies amounted to \$22,136,385, with liabilities of \$1,932,625.

Big Sums for Benefits.

In addition, 94 societies carry sick and funeral benefits. They have \$3,133 members. Last year \$97,701 was paid in funeral benefits on account of 1,614 deaths. There were 25,017 sick during the year, the average cost of treatment of \$507,766 in benefits and \$62,185 to doctors. The assets are placed at \$2,035,371, and the liabilities at \$21,100.75.

Weather Insurance.

There are now three weather insurance companies doing business in Ontario, two new ones having been launched in 1906.

They are the Huron Weather, the Ontario Farmers' Western Farmers, and they carry 3,730 policies, covering risks totaling \$4,154,236.

Last year their receipts amounted to \$9,160. For losses, \$1,628.15 was paid for management, \$4,061; total expenses aggregating \$7,249.

Mutual Fire Companies.

The report also shows that in mutual fire insurance companies, which may be described as the public ownership of insurance, the enormous sum of \$20,920,729 is covered by the risks of 83 companies, the various classes. The new business taken in 1906 alone amounted to \$85,834,494.

The three joint stock fire insurance companies had assets amounting to \$455,917.11, not including subscribed stock uncalled of \$519,237.50. They hold 33,729 policies, with \$29,951,250.56 at risk. Their income for the year aggregated \$438,828.95, and their expenditure amounted to \$396,945.36, including \$157,621.08 in losses.

There are fourteen cash mutual fire insurance companies, with risks aggregating \$148,154,923, covering 138,680 policies. Their total assets, \$2,835,750 and liabilities \$764,019. The losses last year amounted to \$786,665, contributing to the total expenditure of \$1,560,343.

Sixty-nine companies are described as "purely mutual fire insurance companies," being mostly farmers' companies. They hold 118,897 policies, covering risks aggregating \$190,119,982. They paid in losses last year \$359,930.

A Failure.

In a lengthy consideration of the merits of state life insurance in the empire, Dr. Hunter concludes that it has been a failure.

MOVING THE WHEAT

Plenty of Boats To Handle the Crops From Port Arthur.

Port Arthur, Nov. 11.—The shipment of the western grain crop from the head of the great lakes to the eastern elevators has this year developed a peculiar condition of affairs.

As the crop was late in being harvested, the natural expectation was of a greater rush in the closing weeks of navigation, causing a higher rate than usual, but the rates are less than prevailed last year. A year ago the vessel rates were getting 2½ cents a bushel for transporting the grain, and this season they are taking it down the lakes at 2 cents.

It has also been shown that whatever fears there might have been a few weeks ago that boats would not be available are not being realized. All the boats needed are obtainable. This results not from scarcity of grain shipments as compared with other years, but from the activity of the navigation companies in adding to their fleets to be ready to meet the increasing demand.

The grain shipments this year have been much more steady than in past years. Many vessels have been engaged in the trade all through the season and not so much in the one and coal carrying business as formerly. This is a result of the conditions which developed from the cold winter in the west last year.

PROBING EXPRESS COMPANY

Is United States Express Company Controlled by Other Concerns?

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 11.—Arguments were heard this afternoon by the public service commission in the second district on the request of certain shareholders of the United States Express Company to consider the advisability of conducting an investigation into the affairs of the company, with a view especially of recommending to the Legislature amendments in the law relating to joint stock associations conducting the business of common carriers.

The complaint alleges the United States Express Company is practically controlled by two other companies, the Adams and American Express Companies, and that it has not for years had a meeting of stockholders for the purpose of electing directors.

It is claimed that shareholders representing more than one-half the capitalization of the company requested the officers to call a meeting of the shareholders for the election of directors, but the request was denied.

Albert B. Boardman, of New York, appeared for the express company, and Eugene Kramer, of New York, and Samuel S. Hall, of Albany, for the petitioners.

FIGHTING NINE-HOUR DAY

The Toronto Employers' Association Protests to the Mayor.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—A strong protest has been entered to the mayor of Toronto by the Employers' Association against the insistence of the nine-hour day with regard to civic contracts. In a letter to the mayor, the association states that the question has been raised by the "Machinists' Union," an organization that has been unsuccessful in fastening upon the metal trades of the city the nine-hour day or 50-hour week. It is pointed out that Toronto firms are now conceding five hours in the manufacturing of goods to their provincial and foreign competitors and to have an additional five hours from their working time, while the same conditions do not apply to firms outside the city limits, would be an obstacle in competition too great to be overcome, and at the same time unreasonable discrimination against local industries.

SEVEN MINERS KILLED. St. Etienne, France, Nov. 11.—An ascending cage in a mine at Rambaud, near here, was struck today by a descending car, and seven occupants of the latter were thrown out, fell to the bottom of the shaft, and were killed.
