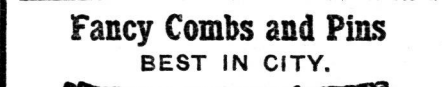

STEAMER FOUNDERS.

London, Nov. 23.—A steamer was foundered off the north coast of Spain on Nov. 7th is now believed to be the British Indian liner Abnoba. The Abnoba was of 4,000 tons, and was built this year. She sailed from the Clyde Nov. 3 for Rangoon, British India, arriving at Plymouth Nov. 5. This was her maiden voyage, and she carried no passengers. The crew number 90, of whom 18 were whites.
