TORONTO INCENDIARY IS WORKING OVERTIME

Big Four-Story Warehouse Was Burned on King Street.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Aug. 31.—Thousands of exhibition visitors were treated to a pyrotechnic display while returning from the big fair between 11 o'clock and midnight Saturday night, when a large four-story building at 277 King street west, formerly occupied by the James Robertson Company and recently by the Adams Furniture Company, but only three days previously vacated, to be torn down to make way for the new C. P. R. freight sheds, was almost gutted.

That the blaze was the work of an incendiary, Sergt. Duncan, of No. 1 police station, is firmly convinced. No person with authority to be on the premises had been in the building. It is presumed that some destructively inclined person gained entrance by climbing the fire escape at the rear and entering a window on the second story. A watchman apparently started in the bottom of the elevator shaft by lighting a bundle of excelsior packing, which was plentifully stored in the building. About a year ago there were three small fires in the same premises, and a watchman was employed, and he was dismissed. On account of the building being practically empty the loss will slightly exceed \$5,000, covered by insurance.

Another Plum for Mr. Samuel Price

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Aug. 31.—Mr. Samuel Price, law partner of Hon. T. W. Crothers, has come in for another retainer from the Government. He has been appointed a commissioner to investigate reports on certain charges preferred some time ago against the immigration inspector at Bridgeburg, Ont. In regard to a dereliction of duty Mr. Price, in addition to his work for the Government, has been engaged almost constantly by the present Government since it came into office. He prepared a revision and modification of the railway act for Hon. Frank Cochrane, and during the past two months he has been working for Mr. Crothers on a report as to the labor troubles at Vancouver Island.

JUDGE LINDSEY DENIES CHARGES AGAINST HIM

Declares They Are Brought At the Instigation of Crooks.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Washington, Aug. 31.—A mass meeting of suffragists held here tonight was entered by the first public reply of Judge Ben B. Lindsey, of Denver, to charges recently made against him. The charges alleged misconduct of the Denver juvenile court, and were made in the morning by the Progressive League of that city. Judge Lindsey tonight made the counter-charge that this league is only a paper organization of two persons, and is the tool of the same "political influence" which he has been fighting for years in Denver, and which he exposed in the "Beast and the Jungle."

Judge Lindsey declared that the Whitehead "Humane" Society has been his most violent opponent, because of the big crooks, who are the bosses behind the society to protect dive-keepers against whom Lindsey directed his main attack in attempting to diminish immorality among young girls.

"It will be shown," he said, speaking in reply to these attacks, "that is some of the most notorious of these cases involving men of prominence of political influence. The Whitehead-Rates combination have done nothing to bring about their prosecution. They demand a very severe law, and then they winked at it, and the crooks, who have political influence, power or money."

Unknown Pole Had His Head Cut Off

[Special to The Advertiser.] Paris, Aug. 31.—Two Poles, standing a mile on a south-bound train on the C. P. R. this morning got off the train on a bridge about three miles northwest of here this morning, where the train stopped, and started ahead of the train to walk across the bridge. They were not noticed as the train moved ahead, and one of them jumped over the side of the bridge to the ground, which he did, and the other tried to drop through the train struck him, completely severing the head from the body. The man who was on the train, saying he had met him on the train, and did not know his name, only that he was a Pole.

Drunken Driver Held for Murder

Davidge is technically charged with operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, a charge on which he has been arrested before. Friends offered bail in all or any amount for Davidge's release.

CRITICIZE CARNEGIE

German Press Scores Steel Magnate's References to the Kaiser.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Berlin, Aug. 31.—Andrew Carnegie is being severely criticized by the German press for his reference to the Kaiser in his peace address at The Hague.

Nationalist papers find fault with Carnegie for claiming the Kaiser as an adherent of the pacifist cause, whereas he is a believer in big armaments. Other journals say Carnegie's language about the Emperor was much too familiar, and advise him to leave the Kaiser out of his "masquerade."

WILL RECOVER

Girl Has Been Mysteriously Asleep Ever Since July 30.

[Special to The Advertiser.] New York, Aug. 31.—Jennette Guttman, the 13-year-old girl, who has been in a state of coma since July 30 at the Hydropathic Institute, will recover it was announced by physicians today. During her long sleep she has lost no weight, though her daily food has been only five glasses of milk, strengthened with brandy, administered through a tube.

MILLIONAIRE AND SISTER PLANNED DEATH PACT

Woman Is Dead and Wealthy Banker Is Still Unconscious.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Philadelphia, Aug. 31.—Coroner Neville, of Montgomery County, is probing the mysterious death of Miss Jane Jamison, of Radnor, who died at the Bryn Mawr Hospital late this afternoon of bichloride poison. Her brother, George Jamison, aged 62, a retired millionaire banker, is also at the hospital and is still unconscious. Every effort to suppress the facts in the mystery was made by the hospital authorities and by Dr. James Tyson, the emeritus professor of medicine at the University of Pennsylvania, who is a relative of the Jamisons, and who was called in as soon as the dying banker and his sister were found.

So far the evidence of the servants would tend to show that the death of the sister of the banker and the millionaire's own condition was the result of a well-planned pact. All the servants were dispatched for the day, and yesterday they were told that Mr. and Mrs. Jamison intended to go to the seashore for a two-weeks' sojourn. These servants, who had not intended to go to church were asked to go, as the banker and his sister had said to some of their affairs before their departure from their estate.

It is believed that the suicide pact was entered into because of reduced circumstances, which allowed the banker to buy the servants in their beautiful Radnor home, whereas they have been accustomed to having at least six retainers.

Tobacco War Is Feared In England

[Special to The Advertiser.] London, Aug. 31.—Rumors of another tobacco trade war have originated here owing to the presence in London of John S. Burroughs, of the Tobacco Products Corporation, who has opened offices here and plans to rent several shops.

It is reported that the Tobacco Products Corporation has decided to establish an English branch to challenge the supremacy of the British Tobacco Trust, and capture a portion of the retail trade. Another report says that the Tobacco Products Corporation is concluding a deal with the Albert Baker Company, which owns many retail shops throughout London.
