It is impossible to build up a strain of profitable egg-producers if inbreeding is carried on; and it is well nigh impossible to build up a high class strain of show birds by out-breeding methods. In the former class of fowls we want stamina; in the latter class of fowls show points and the man who endeavors to produce by inbreeding methods fowls possessing both standard and utility qualities is trifling with time. Inbreeding concerns the exhibitor, out-breeding i. e., breeding from unrelated stock, concerns the utilityite. 
