MAJOR COLES TO LEAVE CITY ON WEDNESDAY

London Officer Going to Assume Duties at Valcartier — A. S. C. to Strike Camp.

Major W. G. Coles, who yesterday was notified from Ottawa that he had been given a major's commission and appointed to command a provisional train, will leave for Valcartier to assume his new duties on Wednesday. On that day, also, the Army Service Corps camp at Carling's heights will be struck, the remount horses on hand, numbering near 200, shipped to the Valcartier camp and the men paid off.

At present the corps roll shows about 30 names, but some of these are from out of town and probably will take their discharge when they cease to draw pay. For the present, no attempt will be made to recruit up to strength again.

TAKE RESERVIST FROM NELSON ST. HOME

Man Under Observation For Some Time by Police Arrested Yesterday.

Another Austrian reservist, Basil Gwosdz, arrested by the police yesterday at a house on Nelson street, London, South, was taken to the Kingston in charge of Sergeant Root and Private Reading, of the Seventh Regiment, there to remain in duration until the end of the war.

Gwosdz had been under observation by the police for some days, and yesterday officers visited the house where he has been living and quietly phoned him under arrest. He was turned over to the military authorities after he had been searched and relieved of a number of official-looking documents printed and written in Austrian, and was placed under guard in the Armories pending his removal this morning.
