LONDON ENGINEERS HAVE A FINE TIME AT SPRINGBANK

Railwaymen and Families Have Number of St. Thomas Guests

Local Men Prove to Have Strongest "Pull."

London railway engineers held their picnic to Springbank on Thursday afternoon, and for the time forgot their work and had a good time. Nearly three hundred of the engineers, their wives, children and friends enjoyed the hospitality of the brotherhood. St. Thomas teams, the event being won by the local men in their picnic. The events were carefully prepared to include both old and young, everyone spending the afternoon in the best manner possible. Some of the races were well attended and all entered heartily into the day's sport. The feature of the day was the tug-of-war between London and St. Thomas teams, the event being won by the local engineers, who had two of the pulls to their credit. The ladies provided a fine supper in the pavilion, and everyone went home after spending one of the best days of the season at the park. The winners in the various events were:

Repairs on the Wellington street asphaltic block pavement will be started next week, the engineer reporting that he had notified the company to start within six days.

Plans are being made for reinforced concrete pavement on Bellevue, Duchess and Tecumseh avenues and Marley Place, South London. The total estimated costs of these works is placed at \$18,347.

Sanitary sewer on Dundas avenue and on Huron street, at an estimated cost of \$1,700, were recommended to the council.

On request of north-end residents, who declared that a fully-served petition for the work had been submitted over six months ago, the city engineer was ordered to prepare an estimate of cost for laying a sanitary sewer on Wellington street, between Victoria and Huron streets.

In reporting on the Nelson street improvements, stopped by Judge Talbot Macbeth, the city engineer said that records in the assessment office revealed the fact that the residents for 330 feet east of Clarence street had encroached 25 feet and fenced off that property. It was for this reason that City Engineers Tracey and Graydon had refused to sanction improvements here.

Engineer Ashburn recommended the purchase of a 220-foot frontage for the purpose of making the improvements, if it was the wish of the board to continue them.

Cut Out Street

Stringing of banners across the street, permission to do which was granted to several applicants, was the subject of no little discussion. Chairman Bennett declared that while it was impossible, under existing conditions to allow one banner to go and refuse another London should be past the village street. He announced his intention of moving that the present banner bylaw be rescinded and one substituted refusing permission to allow any at all to be strung across the streets.

Requests for ash removal from some of the large manufacturing places of the city that had been forwarded to Supt. W. C. Dodd, of the garbage collection department, and which had been refused by him because they were "manufacturers' waste," were read to the board. Job Cook, a resident of South street,

BROTHER GOES

MILE FOR HELP;

CHILD DROWNED

Frightened Boy Did Not Realize Others Were Close at Hand

Alfred Wright Fell From Foot-bridge Running From Pine Lawn.

Alfred Wright, the 9-year-old son of Mr. Alexander Wright, of Madison avenue, Pine Lawn, met death in the south branch of the Thames, just west of the hydro transformer station shortly before 7 o'clock Thursday evening.

With two younger brothers, Eddie, aged 6, and Robert, aged 4, the boy was crossing a suspension bridge between Pine Lawn and the farm of Mr. Charles Parkinson, when in some manner, which will probably never be explained, as the two children were the only witnesses of the accident, he fell from the bridge into the water on the east side, about eight feet below. He came to the surface once, but quickly disappeared again. The body was recovered about 7 o'clock this morning, the current of the river having carried it about 50 feet from the spot where the boy disappeared.

Child Panic-Stricken.

No one knew of the accident until the boy had been in the water some ten or fifteen minutes. His 6-year-old brother ran all the way home, a distance of more than a mile, to notify his father of the occurrence. It never occurred to the frightened child to go to some of the adjoining houses, or to stop passersby and tell them, and thus many valuable minutes were lost. Had he notified the people at the Parkinson farmhouse, which is only a few rods from the river, the chances are that the boy could have been rescued. But instead he crossed the bridge and set out for home, with the baby brother following as fast as he was able. Arriving there he apprised his father of the accident, and he immediately rushed down to the bridge. There was no sign of the boy, and the father spent nearly an hour wading about trying to locate the body, but without success. Meanwhile, neighbors came to his assistance, and a boat from the Parkinson farm was launched and a systematic search begun.

Brigade Is Notified.

The fire department was notified and Chief Aitken and two of his men went to the scene with a boat and grappling hooks, etc. Mr. E. V. Buchanan secured the pulmotor from the hydro-electric power station, and it was taken to the scene in the chief's buggy.

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
