Nortolk Farmers See Veiled Threat in Tory Advertising

SIMCOE, Oct. 10.—A thinly-disguised attack by the National Liberal-Conservative supporters against J. Alex. Wallace, Farmer candidate for Norfolk, is seen in the call that went out today for a mass meeting to be held here next Monday to nominate a Government candidate. The exhortation reads: "A call to all persons, both men and women, who are in sympathy with the Meigen Government, irrespective of their former political leaning."

That John H. Martin of Port Dover, known as the American Wyandotte king, may have the nomination for a fight is generally conceded, but whether he would accept it or not is a question that has not been answered.

That protection vs. free trade will be the issue in this constituency is evident. The Liberal-Conservatives declare that the prime qualification of the candidate is that he "must be a protectionist."

Great emphasis is being placed on the women vote here. According to reports emanating from the village of Boston, pourparlers are being carried on with the voters of Townsend Township. Townsend has always held the balance of power when the two political parties were fighting it alone, and that township's support was invariably thrown on the side of the Liberal candidate. With a call for fusion of the two old parties Government supporters claim they have more than a fighting chance, but with Townsend's vote thrown to Mr. Wallace, his election is generally conceded.

Prominently mentioned as the Liberal standard-bearer, Warden R. M. Taylor of Port Dover has decidedly refused the nomination, which likely means there will be no King supporter run in this riding.
