

RAPS JUDGE'S RULING

Leader Asserts No Trades Union in World Is Illegal.

"Since the inauguration of the aggressive anti-workmen tactics on the part of the employers at large about two years ago the unions have not retrogressed one step, but rather they have gone ahead, and the moneyed interests of America now know that they are a force to be reckoned with," said John H. Flett ot Hamilton, in addressing the organization meeting of the London Trades and Labor Council at the Labor Temple last night.

"The trades unions must not delay in getting out and seeking greater additions to their ranks," he continued, "for to defer action in the face of obvious efforts of the capitalists to submerge us will mean nothing short of destruction for our cause.

Oppose Project. "The union printers are working to obtain a 44-hour week, and their em-ployers are opposing the project. Over 300 workmen of this union are out on strike in Toronto, and almost as large a number in Montreal, and they have expended between two and

"Certain employers will not take any workmen over the age of 45 into their employ, and this is highly un-just. If the laboring man is to be treated in that manner and relegated to the industrial scrap heap at the age of 45, it is only just for him to ask for higher wages, that he may be enabled to retire on attaining that

Mr. Flett dwelt at length on the inadvisability of the workingman advocating highly radical labor move-

Since the demise of the Knights of Labor and the advent of the American Federation of Labor there have been about sixteen militant union movements started," he stated, "but most of them have gone to un-known graves, while some of the others have remnants left in scattered parts of America. The I. W. W., the One Big Union, and others of that type, had their day, but now their influence has disappeared. There is a vast difference between the trades union movement as fos-tered by us and these former similar dustrial and economic nature, and is not concerned with the politics or religion of its adherents."

Professor White, Michigan University, Cites Great Inventions To Illustrate Benefits.

SHOWS PROGRESS

Says Impeding Recognition Tendency To Over-Emphasize Conservatism.

Industrial research and its contribution in the development of industry, was the subject of an address by Prof. A. E. White of Michigan University before local businessmen at the Western chemistry building

last night. Professor White delivered a conrincing plea for the establishment of research departments in local fac-tories. He showed the inestimable progress made by research work, and traced briefly its evolution and expansion during the past two decades. The main difficulty impeding rapid recognition of research, he said, was the tendency on the part of many

the tendency on the part of many siness executives towards an overemphasized conservatism. usually exemplified in the policies of old and reputable firms loath to make the slightest departure from antique standards. Lack of foresight in adopting research is frequently the fundamental cause of depression and ultimate failure.

Illustrates Benefits of Work. Professor White illustrated the benefits of the work by citing a few outstanding instances of definite evolutionary discoveries. 
