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ST. CLAIR RIVER BECOMES CENTRE OF BEER TRAFFIC

Dealers Dispose of Wet Goods From Boat In Center of Stream. Special to The Advertiser. Sarnia, June 25.—Confirmation that the trafficking in wet goods has shifted from the Detroit to the St. Clair River was obtained Saturday by an Advertiser correspondent.

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LOUISVILLE MAN KILLS GIRLS AT CHURCH FETE

W. Zinsmeister Ends Own Life When He Sees Escape Impossible. Associated Press Despatch. Louisville, Ky., June 25.—William Zinsmeister, regarded as a desperate character, created havoc among nearly half a hundred persons enjoying themselves at a picnic given by a church club on the banks of the Ohio river, near here yesterday by killing his 13-year-old daughter, a 16-year-old son, and a 14-year-old nephew.

Whether or not a part of the Detroit prohibition navy will be moved to the St. Clair River to cope with this latest operation of the beer trafficking community remains to be seen.

The Advertiser correspondent was reliably informed that the business is increasing daily, and from a comparatively small beginning is reaching a proportion which will call for some drastic action on the part of the American authorities.

Desert Fish Nets. Fishermen along the St. Clair are abandoning the hunt for pickerel in the hunt for beer, and as far as the residents on Canadian side are concerned, there is no secrecy about the business.

So far as the Canadian laws are concerned, the latest manoeuvre is stated to be within the law, all sales being made from a boat in the river. The beer manufactured at Walkerville and other centers is loaded into large motorboats, sometimes several hundred cases to a cargo.

Men on the American side make the arrangements, and speed boats using signal lights meet the supply ship in the river and take off the cargo. The Canadian vendors sell their beer for export and manifests to that effect are made out.

The risk is entirely upon the purchaser, who has to land the wet goods without the knowledge of American customs officials.

Work At Night. Between Port Lambton and Marine City and the locality further north and Stag Island boats are operating far into the night, it is stated, and American summer cottagers on the St. Clair flats are assuaging their thirsts with brew of almost pre-war strength.

Not all the beer finds an American destination however. While sales are only made from the river, some of the boats land on the Canadian side, for the present heat wave acts on Canadian summer resorters the same as those on the other side.
