Professor Reynolds Calls For
Better Understanding of

Rural Problems.

Ingersoll, April 11. The speaker at the meeting of the K. of C. at the home of Professor J. B. Reynolds of the Ontario Agricultural College, yesterday, discussed the conditions of the present as well as of former days, under which the farmer labored. He emphasized the fact that the farmer always endeavored to adapt him to the changes that have taken place. He outlined conditions of pioneer days, the spinning wheel and crude molds, which had been superseded by the textile factory, gas, hydro and other lighting systems.
