

VOICE UNHEARD ON LABOR MEASURES

John Colbert Asks What Mr. White Did as Workers Representative.

Frank White's claims of being a friend of the working man were again refuted by John Colbert, official Labor candidate, today in addressing the men and women workers of the Murray Shoe Company.

When did Mr. White raise his voice in the house of commons to uphold the eight-hour day, the minimum wage measure, the 44-hour week and other proposals vital to the worker? Mr. Colbert asked.

"These matters were brought upon the floor of the house on more than one occasion, but Mr. White failed to aid them, and he calls himself a friend of labor."

Mr. Colbert also took issue with E. S. Little, Liberal candidate, upon his reported promises of urging old age pensions in the house. He wanted to know how Little was going to bring about this reform.

Mr. Colbert said that the older King had refused to take any action along these lines during the past four years.

"Governments in recent years have been guilty of gross mismanagement," the candidate charged. "Both the Liberals and Conservatives represent the financial class and the workers have been left out in the cold. The only way to get legislation in favor of labor is to make the government pass beneficial laws, and you cannot do that without labor men in the house of commons."

The Labor Leader, a weekly printed in Toronto supposedly in the interests of the working man, has never been recognized by the true labor men, he stated. He drew attention to the publication's support of Frank White, and urged labor men to vote for the Conservative candidate.

for the government in the latter part of the campaign undoubtedly has been the growing understanding in relation to the cost of living. Meighen To Be Replaced.

The impossibility of persuading the country that the tariff is not already high enough and the appeal which Mr. King's policy of national unity has made are the chief reasons to which are attributed the increased strength of the Conservatives on the eve of election. Mr. King's policy has come to be understood as the real national policy. His purpose of preserving friendly relations with the United States has been the various sections of the dominion has been contrasted with the sectional policy of the Conservatives.

On the other hand it is now believed that Mr. Meighen will not be at the head of the Conservative party within a short time after the election. The Montreal interest in the Conservative movement are openly out to replace him and even in the other provinces the failure of his campaign has convinced leading Conservatives that a new chief must be found if the party is ever to recover its lost prestige. It has been common report that Conservative money and Conservative efforts are being devoted to Mr. Meighen's defeat in Portage La Prairie in the hope that his failure would render the task of disposing him an easier one.

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OUTPUT OF IRON CUT, SAYS WHITE

Conservative Candidate Makes Appeal to Employees of Perrin's.

Frank White had a large audience at Perrin's today when he addressed a number of the employees in the firm's dining-room at noon. Mr. White stated that the Canadian output of pig iron had been reduced one-half from 1913 to 1924, while American production had gone up 50 per cent. Rolled products were only two-thirds of the 1913 output, while the U. S. had increased 60 per cent.

Mr. White declared that in October, 1923, railroad employees in Canada numbered 177,000, and in October, 1924, but 156,000. There had also been a big reduction in weight of the rails, and he blamed the King government.

"I would consider it a calamity if the King government were to be re-elected," said Mr. White, who went on to tell his hearers that the Canadians had emigrated to the United States to make up the population of eight cities the size of London. There might be some consolation in this, but he conceded that they were very small in numbers.

Mr. White, in conclusion, asked for the support of every employee of the firm, and he felt that Mr. Meighen was the proper man to lead Canada, and would certainly remedy all the ills of the country, as he saw them.

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NEW AGREEMENT WITH L.S.R. LOOMS

Representatives of Road Will Attend No. 1 Committee Session Tomorrow.

Possibilities of a new agreement with the London Street Railway Company loom closer with the information today that representatives of the street railway company will attend tomorrow night's session of No. 1 committee.

The street railway seeks a new agreement with the city. The city wants six or seven miles of paving done next year, an undertaking that cannot possibly materialize unless there is an agreement with the street railway company, according to the attitude of Mayor Wenig.

Up to now the council has not secured a definite proposal from the L. S. R. concerning franchise details. The mayor wants a three-clause ballot submitted to the electorate this year. Two clauses would comprise purchase options and the third would relate to an extension of the company's franchise. Mr. Wenig asserts that now is the time to settle the street railway matter, getting six miles of paving done next year and solving the works department employment problem for the present.

Mr. Wenig suggests such a three-clause ballot will be suggested to the committee and the street railway representatives will be present to discuss the matter, that of an extension of agreement.

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WHITE GLOVES FOR JUSTICE; NO CRIMINAL CASES FOR TRIAL

Sheriff Graham Will Purchase Haberdashery Before Next Monday.

When Mr. Justice Lennox mounts the bench at the opening of the fall assizes at the courthouse next Monday he will be presented with a pair of white gloves by Sheriff Donald Graham in token of the fact that there are no criminal cases set down for trial.

Crown Attorney Albert M. Judd stated this morning that there was nothing of a criminal nature to bring before his lordship, and the information has been passed along to the sheriff, who will make the necessary purchase.

The police being able to lay their hands on Ed. Hariton, Mr. Justice Lennox would have been called on to preside over another murder trial some 18 months ago his lordship sentenced three men to hang at the Middlesex jail.

There are four jury and ten non-jury cases scheduled for trial, but settlements are expected in several actions, lawyers state.

Doris M. Turner, London, entered a \$3,000 damage action today against George Valentine of Forest as a result of injuries she received on Sept. 9, 1924, when she was struck by a car at Richmond and Bridgeway. Miss Turner states that she received other serious injuries, and asks for the payment of two bills of \$183 and \$120. She alleges that the defendant was negligent in driving the car, and who in turn declares that Miss Turner was to blame for the accident. Gladman & Sweeney, plaintiffs, and Gibbons, Harter, and McCall, defendants.

Another jury action is that of Col. W. G. Coles against John Duggan, plaintiff, seeking the return of \$3,000, the understanding that it was not to be used unless \$100,000 was a sub-plaintiff and Duggan, defendant. Mr. Judd stated that it was a matter of defense, and that the plaintiff was not to be paid unless the defendant was found to be liable.

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GREECE ORDERS TROOPS RETURN

Immediate Evacuation of Bulgarian Territory Follows Ultimatum From League.

Associated Press Despatch. Athens, Oct. 27.—The Greek government today ordered the prompt evacuation of Bulgarian territory by its forces. The movement to withdraw the Greek frontier guards to their former posts has been begun.

ANNOUNCES AGREEMENT.

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, Oct. 27.—Greek representative, M. Carapanos, announced at the opening of today's meeting of the league of nations council that through the mediation of Rumania, a direct agreement has been reached between Bulgaria and Greece for the evacuation of their respective territories.

The conditions of the agreement, he says, were that Bulgarian troops should proceed this afternoon to the frontier to arrange for the return of the Greek border guards to their original posts. The Greek troops in Bulgaria would begin their withdrawal immediately, and the Bulgarian forces would not advance in a manner to hinder the Greeks until the latter had crossed the frontier.
