Alberta Police Hunt Joe Black Horse, Suspected of Crime.

Lethbridge, Alta., Nov. 5.-One of the most brutal crimes in the history of Southern Alberta was discovered late Saturday night, when the charred remains of 16-year-old Winnie Tolestrup of Raymond were found in a strawstack on the Rahl farm, three miles from the town of Raymond. Police are hot on the trail of Joe Black Torse, a blood Indian, on whom suspicion strongly rests. Black Horse has disappeared from the reserve, drace Donald, Geraldine Faulds, taking his family with him. At an early hour this morning, the Indian Norah Wade, Afleen Pleasence Park of the Anglo-Saxon race so much

was still at large.

It is the first crime of murder implicating an Indian since the early days of Southern Alberta and the whole countryside is up in arms. 
